

XMAS MAILING ADVICE GIVEN BY J. MC CALL

Regulations Governing Heavy Yuletide Load Explained Today

With the holiday season approaching, the postoffice department has everything in readiness for the annual quadrupling in volume of mails required to be handled during the Christmas season of greetings and gift-giving.

To quote the Klamath Falls postmaster, J. A. McCall: "Post-offices will make every effort to handle the Christmas mails without congestion, but owing to the enormous volume, this can only be done with the co-operation of the public. Mail for early delivery before Christmas day, on which there will be no mail delivery."

"Compliance with the following suggestions will greatly aid the postoffice and insure prompt handling of your mail:

Wrapping Matter
All parcels must be securely wrapped or packed. Use strong paper and heavy twine.

Fragile Objects
Articles easily broken or crushed must be crated or securely wrapped. Use liberal quantities of excelsior, or like material, in, around and between articles and outside container.

Perishable Matter
Articles likely to spoil within the time reasonably required for transportation and delivery will not be accepted for mailing. Wrap or pack carefully, according to contents, and plainly mark all such parcels "perishable." Use special delivery stamps to expedite delivery.

Addresses
Addresses should be complete with house number and name of street, postoffice box or rural route number, and typed or plainly written in ink. A return card should be placed in the upper left corner of every piece of mail. If a tag is used, the address and return card should also be written on the wrapper for use if tag is lost, and a copy of the address should be enclosed inside the parcel.

Postage
Postage must be fully prepaid on all mail. Affix the required amount of postage in the upper right corner. Full information concerning postal rates can be obtained at the parcel post or stamp window.

Limit of Weight and Size
No parcel may be more than 34 inches in length and girth combined. For delivery locally and in the first and second zones, 70 pounds is the maximum weight; in all other zones, 50 pounds.

Poplar Trees Being Planted On Home Sites

Carolina poplar trees, numbering more than 500, are now being planted in Homedale this week along the streets and in front of the acre tracts.

J. A. Farley, landscape gardener, is furnishing the trees and supervising the work, to see that each acre will have trees located the same, and evenly divided between the lots.

Homedale, one of Klamath's suburban acreage subdivisions, is located about three miles out on Sixth and one-half mile south on the Merrill-Lakeview highway. A road is being gravelled into the tracts now, and will be completed in a short time. Streets in the subdivision are already gravelled and graded.

The tracts are irrigated, and the soil is deep, of a sandy-loam formation, being well suited for gardening or raising of fruits or potatoes, it is said. The tracts range from one acre to eight acres in size.

COLD SNAP IN OREGON NEARS CLOSE, REPORT

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7, (AP)—Promise of probably unsettled weather late Friday in western Oregon was held out today by the weather bureau as an indication that the December cold snap was nearing its end. Another night of freezing temperature tonight, was promised before the expected moderation.

Portland had a minimum of 33 degrees last night; Baker 19; Marshfield 28; Medford 28; and Roseburg 24.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7, (AP)—In caring for its Indian wards the United States will spend \$26,310,815 in the fiscal year of 1930 if the recommendations of the budget submitted to congress today by President Coolidge are followed. The amount of the estimated cost of operating the Indian bureau next year is \$104,000 more than that appropriated by congress for the present year.

Included in the list of expenditures, the government makes provision for caring for the irrigation systems in the various reservations, the education of the Indians in the Indian schools and for fulfilling the treaties with them. The Indian school at Salem, Ore., is allotted \$240,000.

CAPTAIN H. COE PASSES AWAY

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Dec. 7, (AP)—Captain H. C. Coe, 80, pioneer steamboat navigator of the Upper Columbia river, died at Redondo Beach, Calif., yesterday. News of his death reached relatives here today.

Captain Coe and a brother built and operated some of the first steamboats that plied the Upper Columbia river. The town of Hood River was founded by Captain Coe's father, Nathaniel Coe, in 1850. The present city is located on the donation land claim of the Coe family.

S. McCORMICK INCOMPETENT, RULES JURIST

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 7, (UP)—Stanley McCormick, brother of Harold F. McCormick, International Harvester company executive, today was adjudged mentally incompetent to administer his \$10,000,000 estate.

Stanley's wife and his brother, Harold, were appointed conservators of the estate by probate judge Henry Horner. Stanley McCormick resides in Santa Barbara, Calif.
