KIDDIES SHAKE SANTA'S HAND

Two Thousand Children Throng Store of K. Sugarman

Roddes, numbering more than 2000 thronged the K. Sugarman Store Friday evening when K. Sugarman was host, treating the children of Santa Claus age to candies and novelties.

The arrival of Santa Claus was announced for 7:15 o'clock. Long before 7 o'clock, hundreds of men, women and children had gathered about the store, awaiting his arrival. Traffic officers were called to handle traffic which was blocked because of the crowd.

Led by the Klamath Union high school band, Santa Claus arrived at the store where he delivered the goodies.

Little tots hardly able to walk, shook hands with Santa Claus and clutched the big stick of candy which he gave them.

DAIRY FUTURE BRIGHT, CLAIM

spoke on the dairy industry of the country, calling attention to the fact that there are now 6300 head of milk cows here, but that there is room for 20,000. He went into the merits of the dairy business and spoke plainly to all who are in the market for cows, urging them to be careful of what they buy. Discussed cows are being offered for sale in different parts of the country, and the county agent gave some splendid advice to all who anticipate the purchase of stock.

Prof. Brandt Delivers Address. Handling the subject of marketing dairy products in a manner that showed deep study, Prof. P. M. Brandt of Oregon State college, delivered an address to those present that was priceless, provided his suggestions are followed. He painted no glowing pictures, neither did he deal in eloquence for the sake of oratorical effect, but he did tell the dairymen of Klamath basin that they are more fortunately located than those of any other location on the coast.

To back up his statement, he called attention to the large cities in the south which must be fed, to the liquid milk markets possible for Klamath producers to enter, to the low cost of production here when compared with other sections, and he closed by saying that nowhere else is there a locality that can withstand the time when the absorption point of dairy products is reached so well as can the Klamath basin.

Dairymen Speak.

Ray Lowmy, a practical dairymen of Port Klamath, told in plain words how to succeed in dairying in Klamath county. His prescription carried in it quite a lot of work, following rules laid down by the government and state departments, selection of good cows, and attending to the business just the same as other lines of business are run. He said every time he had deviated from the government's rules he had been forced to back up.

Paul Jackson, president of the Klamathians, admitted that he could not talk cows and that he knew but little about farming. His speech was one of good fellowship, and expressed a desire to further the friendly feeling and co-operation between the

town and county. In this he spoke the spirit of the Klamathians, for it is their program to join with the different community clubs and help solve some of the problems that confront the country.

Dr. E. D. Lamb was welcomed by Trustmaster Halber for the time he has given to milk inspection, and the doctor responded by telling of his interest in having pure milk sold to the families of the county.

Judge Goddard related some interesting experiences when he was a cow milk year ago, at a time when all cows looked alike to the ranchers, and the ones called milk cows were those who did not kick. His speech was full of fun.

The chief speaker of the evening was J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner of Oregon. For years and years he has held this job and during his administration has raised the standard of Oregon dairies materially. So much has he done for the industry that President Coolidge appointed him to represent the United States at the international dairy meeting in London recently.

It was this international meeting that he spoke of and with his comical illustrations, his happy description of the Englishmen and others on the other side of the Atlantic he wove together a most interesting and entertaining speech besides giving everyone a keen insight into the way they do things in the old world.
