History of Christmas Seal Told—

It might be of interest to people of Klamath Falls and the surrounding community to learn that the Christmas Seal Sale idea was first conceived by a Danish postal clerk in Copenhagen, according to information given by Mrs. A. R. Tenbrook, chairman of the drive in this city. The purpose was to raise money for a children's hospital. A letter bearing one of these stamps came into the hands of the late Jacob Rits in New York, who was very much interested in the sea breeze hospital. He wrote an article concerning the stamp which was published in the Outlook. The idea was immediately taken up by others, including a Miss Hilly of Delaware who by its use raised \$3,000 for a tuberculosis pavilion in that state. In 1905, the American Red Cross began a nation wide sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals. In 1910 the National Tuberculosis Association joined the Red Cross in the Christmas Seal Sale, a partnership that lasted until 1920. Since then the National Tuberculosis Association has been the principal mover in the sales.
