

LOWDEN PLEAS WITH FARMERS TO CO-OPERATE

Ex-Governor of Illinois Makes First Statement Since Convention

CHICAGO, Dec. 13, (UP)—An appeal to farmers of the nation to co-operate with President-elect Hoover in effecting his "stabilization plan" for farm relief, was made today by Former Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois.

Lowden's statement was the first he has made since he withdrew from the race for the Republican presidential nomination at the Kansas City convention when the equalization fee principle for farm relief was defeated.

He made the statement in a letter to President-elect Earl C. Smith of the Illinois agricultural association and it was read before the convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation. He pointed out the political campaign between Hoover and Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York had developed a "perfect clean-cut issue" over farm relief and that Hoover's plan was in effect endorsed.

Mill Workers Shot Down By India Police

BOMBAY, India, Dec. 13, (UP)—Three policemen and six mill-workers were killed today in a pitched fight after strikers had terrorized the suburb of Parel at the northern end of the city.

The strikers rioted, overwhelmed what police there were in the district, and looted shops. Police reinforcements, fully armed, were rushed to the scene from headquarters. They found all shops closed that had not been looted, and the business life of the suburb at a standstill.

Reaching the main body of the strikers, the police were met with a bombardment of sticks and stones. The police fired into the mob.

For a few minutes there was desperate fighting. Then the strikers, leaving many injured in addition to their six dead, dispersed.
