

MEYERS WINNER OF MAT MATCH

Clete Kauffman Thrown, Two Falls Out of Three Last Night

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13. (AP)—The wrestling season opened here last night when Bob Meyers, Tillamook, defeated Clete Kauffman, Columbus, Ohio, in two out of three falls. Kauffman took the first fall in six minutes, 32 seconds with a reverse half-nelson crotch hold. Meyers won the second in 29 minutes 10 seconds with an airplane spin and the final fall in fourteen seconds with another spin. Kauffman was so shaken up after the first aerial ride the final fall was a mere matter of routine. Kauffman weighed 174 and Meyers 172 pounds.

Walter Johnson and Frenchy Lavitt went 30 minutes to a draw in the preliminary.

Lassman Does Not Remember Carnegie Game

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 13. (AP)—Al Lassman, New York university football captain who has been in a hospital here since the Carnegie Tech game of November 17 with a head injury, seems to be suffering from a case of "repeated bumps". He is improving daily.

"We have just learned," said his doctor today, "that Lassman spent almost every week-end in a hospital recovering from head and neck injuries incurred in football. His present case seems to be an accumulation of these repeated bumps."

Lassman is entirely conscious, but, the doctor said: "As in all concussion cases, his memory as to the actual happenings is faulty. He doesn't recall the game, which, to us, is perfectly natural."

His pulse and respiration are normal and there is no sign of a brain hemorrhage. Absolute rest is necessary for full recovery. It was indicated he might be at the hospital for a total of thirty days or more.

The doctor, who has not permitted visitors to enter the injury player's room, said this rule might be put aside if Ken Strong and Bob Barrahee, teammates of Lassman, wanted to see him while in Pittsburgh on their way from New York to the Pacific coast to take part in the East-West football game.

It has never been definitely determined how the giant tackle was hurt, but it is believed he was accidentally kicked by another player.

Substitutions Hurt Football School Claims

NEW YORK, Dec. 13. (AP)—The alumnus weekly of New York university says that frequent substitutions have reduced football from a contest between two representative eleven to a test as to which of two institutions can produce the strongest aggregation of reserves.

N. Y. U. used 194 players in nine games while its opponents used 148. An average of over 29 to the game for N. Y. U. and under 17 for the opposing teams. Only 26 New York players and 31 opponents played through a full game.

VEILED CRONES INCARCERATED

"Medicine Women," Last of Powerful Clan, Are Jailed in Turkey

STAMBOUL, Turkey, Dec. 13. (AP)—Seven stouping, veiled crones with hair and finger tips stained with henna and wrists flinging with lunatic ward off the evil eye, are mumbled impressions against the new order of things as they sit in the prison cells to which the police of the Turkish republic have consigned them.

They are the remnants of a once powerful clan, that of the Modern "medicine-women". These

seven last dogged practitioners have been arrested for having defied the Komalut law forbidding the exercise of their ancient art.

During one day's raid, the police found the seven in different old quarters of Stamboul, each in the act of effecting some one of the many traditional cures, such as waving before a baby's nose a burning hair stolen from the head of the person who has cast the evil eye upon the infant and thereby caused its sickness.
