

NEW RATE OF PHONES NEEDED

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13. (A.P.)—That a coast-wide effort be made for revision of telephone rates, through joint action of the cities of the coast states, was suggested to the city council today by Otto A. Case, chairman of the board of efficiency of Seattle.

He proposed that Portland invite representatives of the coast cities to meet here to ask the interstate commerce commission for authority to scan records of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company in an effort to arrive at equitable rates. He suggested that the representatives of the cities of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada and California at the meeting prepare a brief for submission to the commission.

He urged that the cities work together in a complete investigation of telephone rates, and pointed out that until the records of the company could be seen no fair rate could be set.

At the present time in Portland the telephone company is operating without a franchise. The people at the November election approved a new franchise to take the place of the one that lapsed. The new franchise would reduce rates, but the telephone company notified the city council that it could not accept the franchise.

SAILOR KILLED IN HEAVY SEA

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Dec. 13. (UP)—One sailor was killed and a sea plane was smashed by rough water which impeded gunnery practice of the United States battlefleet off the southern California coast today.

George Robert Hart, 24, seaman aboard the U. S. S. New York was killed when a boat, lowered to take observers to the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, capsized as it touched the water. Hart clung to the boat and was crushed against the side of the battleship.

FAMILIES MOVE TO FARM LANDS

PORTLAND, Dec. 13. (UP)—Eighty one families moved to Oregon during November, according to the monthly report of the Oregon chamber of commerce issued here today.

The emigrants made investments totalling \$298,950 mostly in farm properties, the report said.

BANDIT SHOT BY POLICEMAN

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 13. (AP) Jack Trow, 1028 Ortega street, Santa Barbara, is dying in a local hospital, shot by a policeman whom he held up early today.

Trow was shot by Sergeant Willard J. Cauthard after the officer had grabbed the bandit's gun from his hands in a fight that followed the bandit's commands to "stick 'em up."

The bandit stopped behind Cauthard as the latter was entering his car, forced the officer to sit in the front seat and removed the policeman's pistol from its holster.

As he placed Cauthard's gun in his pocket, Mrs. Cauthard started to enter the automobile but at Cauthard's shout "I am being robbed" she ran to a telephone and called police.

The bandit glanced up at the running woman and when he did, Cauthard struck him, grabbed the bandit's gun from his hand and shot him in the chest. Police surgeons said Trow would die in a few hours.

Wet English Editor Passes Judgment on U. S. Prohibition After Quick Trip Over Nation

The following is made up of excerpts from an article that appeared in the London Daily Express, by its editor, who has just returned from a two months' tour of the United States as head of a party of British editors, visiting under the auspices of the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace. The extracts were made available to the United Press through the courtesy of the Daily Express.

LONDON, Dec. 13.—I have observed the working of the Volstead prohibition act in the United States during a two months' tour across the continent and back, and I regret sincerely to have to say that it is perhaps the most tragic joke that any nation ever played upon itself in the history of civilization.

I went to many private dinners in all parts of the country, and with one exception, in Chicago, I

never saw a prohibition table. I went to cocktail parties attended by state officials, United States legislators, judges and college presidents, and with the fewest possible exceptions they all drank as much or more than they did before prohibition.

All of them said that prohibition is a sad and degrading farce. Many said that before the law was passed they never touched liquor.

In one town we visited there was a great football match. We never expected to see what we did, nor do I ever wish to experience it again. In the evening, at a dance at the hotel where we stayed, the place was crowded by 11 o'clock with young couples in evening dress, shouting, roaring, riotous. By midnight the place was a hothouse. From every window, shouting across the hotel wings, leaned young men and women, singing, hooting, cat-calling and worse.

Then they began throwing things—bedroom furniture, bot-

ties, glasses, trays, pillows, chairs—anything movable.

The fury was maintained through a sleepless night.

I asked a doctor, who was busy then the next morning, how it happened.

"It's gin," he said, "synthetic gin. It drives them temporarily mad. The most pathetic thing is that so many young girls are affected, and have begun to think that it is the right thing to drink."

This deadly gin has ruined more homes, wrecked more young lives, showered more misery on a great and generous-minded country than all the years of straight-forward drunkenness on "pure spirits" ever witnessed during the generations before prohibition hit itself into the vitals of the nation.

Now these are plain facts which have come under my observation. I do not think that the appointment of 50,000 sleuths would put down the evil. But I do think the modification of the act, so that

sale of light wines and beer could be made permissible, would restore the people's self respect.

The American people are sober, moral and decent. The vast majority deliberately defy the Vol-

stead act not because they want to drink spirits, but because they resent the curtailment of their individual liberty.
