Fast Middleweight Has Little Difficulty In Defeating Cleghorn

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 19, (AP)—Georgie Dixon, Portland's negro middleweight contender, had no trouble winning from Walter Cleghorn here last night in their ten round main event, in spite of two former decisions in Cleghorn's favor in previous encounters. Sam Warren, St. Johns, technically stopped Dynamite Murphy, of Condon, four seconds before the close of their six round semi-final, when the referee stopped the match. Eddie Graham, Salem's 125-pounder, won from Johnny Topaz, Pittsburg, four rounds. Frankie Monroe, Hood River, won over Billy Murray, Salem, by technical knockout when Referee Graman stopped the contest in the fourth. Al Kense took an easy decision over Bobby Vernon, four rounds.

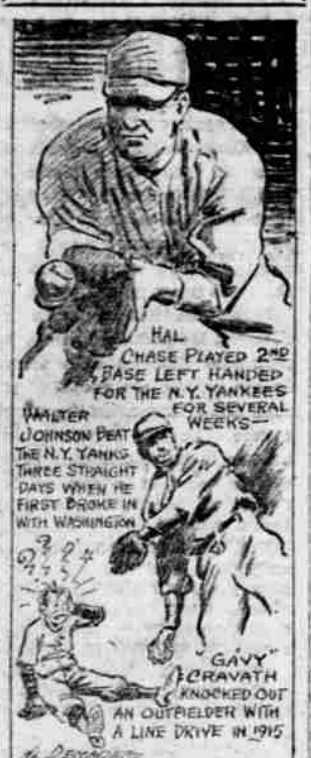

Johnson Beat Yanks Three Straight Days

One of the greatest lures of baseball is its uncertainty. Something different happens every day.

Every new game offers new opportunities for new situations that even the old timers have never seen.

I saw the late Ross Youngs, outfielder of the New York Giants, break Bert Niehoff's leg with his head in making a diving catch. He also broke a third baseman's collar bone with his head in a head first slide into the bag.

"Gavy" Cravath, the old Philadelphia slugger, once almost knocked out both of the Shannon twins with line drives in a single game in 1915.

The first drive took a bad bounce and hit the first Shannon twin on the point of the jaw, knocking him cold and turning a single into a home run.

After they had carried him off the field his twin brother took up his position in left field and on Cravath's next appearance at the plate he handcuffed him with another line drive that drove through his hands and blackened both eyes.

Walter Johnson, the first year he joined the Senators, was talked into pitching three games in a row by the other pitchers on the Washington Club. He fell for their line of chatter and all he did was beat the Yanks three days in succession.

JUNK SHOP IN CHICAGO BLOWN UP WITH BOMB

CHICAGO, Dec. 19, (AP)—Bombers who heretofore always have kept out of sight, came into the open last night and blew up the junk shop of Rudolph and Doppel on Leavitt street.

Instead of throwing the "pine-apple" and then driving away unseen, these bombers entered the shop and overpowered a special policeman and an employee. While one of the men held his victims away with a gun, the other placed a bomb in the center of the place, and lighted the fuse.

"Get out of here after we leave," one bomber said to the two men. They did. The blast caused several hundred dollars damage.

TUBERCULOSIS PROVES FATAL TO COMPOSER

SARANAC, N. Y., Dec. 19, (AP)—Sylvia Hein, 49, noted composer, died of tuberculosis here today.

Hein was the first secretary of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers. Among his better known works were the musical comedies "Yankee Girl," "The Matinee Idol," "Nancy Brown," "When Dreams Come True," "All Dressed Up And No Place to Go," and "Molly Moonshine."

DUGAN DROPPED FROM YANKEES

NEW YORK, Dec. 19, (AP)—"Jumping Joe" Dugan's baseball career, so far as the New York Yankees are concerned, appears to be at an end.

The third baseman, veteran of 12 American league campaigns and of five world's series, was in conference with Ed Barrow, Yankee business manager yesterday and it was commonly understood that it had been agreed that since Dugan was a 16-year man his unconditional release would be given. He expects to be able to land a Major league berth despite the fact that his legs have failed him of recent years.

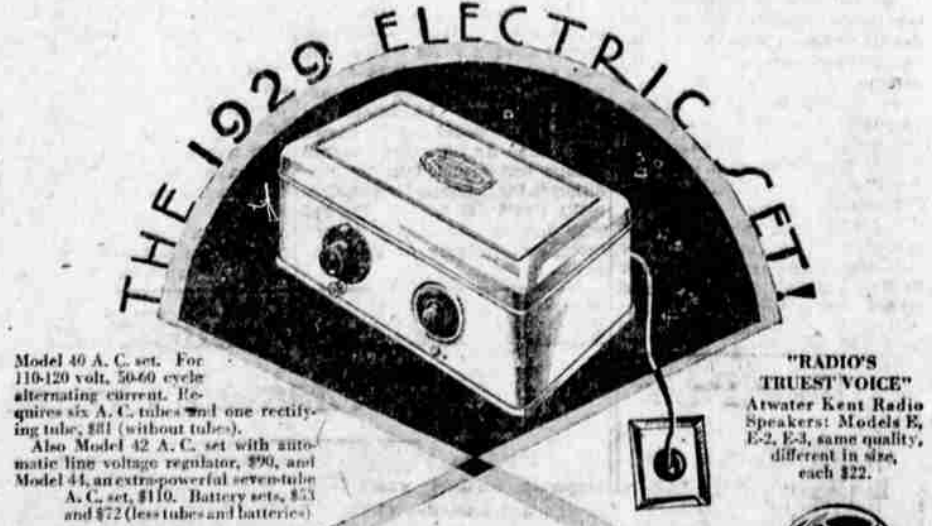
