DEVOS 8 TO 5 FAVORITE OVER NEBRASKA ACE

Hudkins in Great Shape For Hard Clash This Evening

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (AP)—Ace Hudkins, of Nebraska, and Rene Devos of Belgium will battle in New York tonight while the "800 millionaires" and friends of "Tony" Biddle, wealthy backer of the Belgian boxer watch. The fight is a ten round affair and the winner is due to get a shot at Mickey Walker's world's middleweight championship. If Walker can be induced to risk the title.

Whether or not the bout produces a title for the winner it should give the fans plenty to watch. The two free swinging fighters, both willing to take a couple of blows to give a few, appear perfectly matched and there is no doubt that both are ready to fight all the way. Hudkins has won something of a reputation for sheer willingness that produces results with a string of knockouts and slashing victories. Devos likewise has shown plenty of courage as well as punch in battling his way to the top flight of middleweights.

The "Nebraska Wildcat" rose from the floor to knock out Ruby Goldstein when Ruby was at his best and followed with two victories over Sammy Baker in three attempts. His one meeting with Walker brought a victory for the champion that some ringsters were inclined to dispute.

At the end of their preparations Devos was an 8 to 5 favorite, principally because of a six pound weight advantage and the boxing knowledge he combines with his slugging but speculators were timid because of reports of the Belgian's weight. He has been having some trouble making the 160 pound limit.

Hudkins tipped the scales at 154 pounds after his final workout.

KNER TO PLAY ON WEST TEAM

Former Great U. S. C. Halfback Will Again Don Moleskins

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28. (AP)—Morton Kner, former University of Southern California star and late of the San Francisco Olympic club, has been added to the west team to take the place of "Brick" Marcus, a halfback, who was injured earlier in the week. The Westerners clash with an Eastern eleven here Saturday in their annual charity game.

Kner will have only one day of practice with the Western eleven but he is familiar with their style of play and Coach Orin Hollingbery is confident that he can work into the combination.

Meanwhile, with the West facing the problem of reorganization, the Eastern gridgers are running along smoothly in the Stanford University stadium. Both teams have ended their hard scrimmages, and the workout today will consist of light tapering off practices.

WORLD WAR VET KILLS GANGSTER

CHICAGO, Dec. 28. (AP)—There aren't any more bullets in Joseph M. Adler's old army pistol today, but there is one less bandit alive.

Adler came out of the world war with the revolver and a wooden leg. Last night, when four men held up his drug store, the war veteran, who was in his living quarters above the store, took the gun from a drawer and hobbled downstairs.

Through a peephole Adler saw his clerk being held off by revolvers of the four robbers. Pushing open the door and bracing himself with his wooden leg, Adler opened fire. His first shot went through the heart of one of the bandits, later identified by fingerprints as Harry Cassel, 24. Another man was wounded and had to be dragged from the store by his companions, who returned Adler's fire without effect.

Persons who were in a South Clark street restaurant early last night when Onafio Dipolito was shot dead as he was eating dinner, said after viewing Cassel's body today, that Cassel was one of the three men who shot Dipolito.

There was still another slaying on the south side during the night. The body of Linus Nelson, a carpenter, was found in an alley near his home. He had been stabbed to death.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Dec. 28. (AP)—A vaudeville show originated and presented by women inmates of the prison was presented before a few officials of the institution last night.

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MEXICAN INSURGENT WHO ENDEAVORED TO KIDNAP MORROW, HELD

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28. (AP)—Maximiliano Viguera, insurgent leader credited with two attempts to capture United States Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow, was under arrest today. He was captured in the town of Chalco and sent to Mexico City for trial in compliance with the new ruling against summary executions of insurgents.

Depredations laid to Viguera have so affected tourist travel that the national highways commission had offered a reward of 3,000 pesos (\$2,500) for his capture.

Viguera told newspapermen that upon learning that President Porfirio Gil had promised a fair trial for everyone including insurgents, which he styles himself, he decided to surrender. One of his own relatives who is a lieutenant in the home guard troops at the town of Chalco, however, captured him but four companions succeeded in escaping.

Police announced that letters on the stationery of the league for defense of religious liberty were found in Viguera's pockets and that these instructed him as to the manner in which he was to carry on his campaign against the government.

The first attempt to capture Ambassador Morrow with which Viguera is credited occurred about five months ago on the highway between Mexico City and Puebla when the ambassador was returning from Puebla. Although a number of automobiles were stopped on the road about the time the Morrow car was due to pass, the ambassador's automobile got through safely.

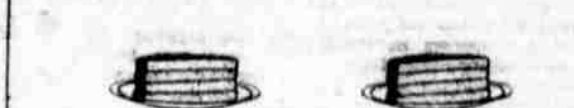
A second attempt was made on the Cuernavaca highway when Mr. Morrow was returning to

Mexico City after spending a week-end at Cuernavaca. Viguera's men attacked the town of Huixtla on the highway and they were credited with intending to capture the ambassador when he drove through.
