Two Teams in Trim For Big Clash Tuesday

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 29. (AP)—The height of physical perfection today apparently had been reached by the football forces of Georgia Tech and California, which on New Year's day, will carry the gridiron banners of the east and west into the Rose Bowl here for a battle of supremacy. Announcements had come from the coaches of the respective squads indicating that the 72 hours remaining before the gridiron classic would be spent in "polishing off." After fierce workouts yesterday the Golden Tornado of Tech was ready to blow over the Bear, and the California Bear was equally ready to reduce the redoubtable windstorm from the south to a gentle seephyr.

Not desiring to lose players through injury, Coach Clarence "Nibs" Price of California and Coach Bill Alexander of Tech, said that from now on the time would be devoted to shorter workouts than have been in order.

Rickard Gives Details About Coming Fight

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Dec. 29. (UP)—"You fellows," said Tex Rickard, with a twinkle in his eye, "already know so much more about this fight than I do that there ain't much use telling you anything."

The promoter arrived at Miami Beach today, primed to make his long-delayed announcement of the next big heavyweight match, only to find that everyone seemed to feel further information superfluous.

"Well, anyhow," Tex continued, "here's the story: I've signed Jack Sharkey and young Stribling to box ten rounds—on February 27—on Wednesday—in an arena we'll build here at the dog racing park of the Miami Kennel club."

"The fight will be under the auspices of the American Legion so we can have a decision, and the winner will get a chance at the heavyweight championship and that Tunney-Muldoon trophy thing later on, probably in September."

"Jack Dempsey will be here to watch the fight, and if he thinks he has a chance to lick the winner, he'll probably come back to the ring, and be one of the two men who fight for the title in the fall."

"The top price for the show will be \$25, I expect, and we ought to have about 50,000 people there. We'll build an arena to hold that many, and we ought to take in around \$400,000. From the requests I've had already for tickets, I should say this was going to be the biggest thing of its kind ever held outside a championship fight."

"I think that if Dempsey does meet the winner of this bout between Stribling and Sharkey that everyone will admit the winner of the fight in September is the real heavyweight champion."

Rickard said Sharkey and Stribling would come here to train early in February.

PLANT DISEASE PROBLEM FACED

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mature plants, and their destruction with chemicals that do not harm the seeds themselves.

Just as mosquitoes carry the malarial germ from one person to another, plant lice are responsible for the spread among potato tubers of the disease known as net-necrosis. Prof. A. H. Glibber of the McDonald college, Quebec, declared, connecting it with the widespread ailment of potato plants called leaf-roll.

Studies of the latest addition to this group of disease, which causes degeneration of potato tubers and plants, were reported by Dr. E. S. Schultz of the department of agriculture, and Reiner Bonds of the Maine agricultural experiment station.
