Dorothy Mackaye Joyful as Prison Sentence Draws To Close; Plans Stage Career

San Quentin State Prison, Cal., Jan. 1. (UP)—Joy overcame Dorothy Mackaye, once popular actress, as she prepared last night to walk from this prison early New Year's Day after 18 months at a sewing machine.

She would not discuss plans for the future, apparently wishing to forget for the moment the unpleasant prospect of difficulties to overcome before she can realize an ambition to remain a player in front of the spot light.

Miss Mackaye's intention to renew contact with the theatrical world has often been voiced by her since she came here and she has endeavored to maintain good health and posture in the drab surroundings.

A few gray hairs have appeared and the absence of cosmetics has resulted in a pallor unknown to her friends during her successful days but her enthusiasm has not been noticeably dimmed and she seemed as lively as when she danced on the ferry that brought her here.

Inmates of the penitentiary will lose one of their most popular entertainers because Miss Mackaye, as a part of her program to keep fit for a possible return to the stage, has volunteered to take part in all shows presented during the past 18 months.

Only a week ago she played the part of a school teacher in the Christmas play.

The actress had expected a possible term of three years but the State Prison Board decided Sunday that she should only be required to serve one year and under a provision for "first offenders" the day for her freedom was advanced two months.
