HARRY W. POOLE will open his new half million dollar theatre on January 17th and when the doors of that magnificent structure are thrown open to the public Mr. Poole will have spoken in stronger terms than any words his faith in Klamath Falls and Southern Oregon.

Without attempting to give in this editorial a description of the finest play house in any city under 100,000 population on the Pacific coast, we wish to speak a word from the heart telling of our appreciation and the appreciation of this community of the man who has pressed forward in the erection of a play house that is so thoroughly outstanding in every particular, that months before its opening it has been the talk of the coast.

We all believe that Klamath is entitled to such a structure for we are sure that she will support it most loyally, but even so, it takes a man with vision and courage to erect a building costing more than a half million dollars when one costing much less would have sufficed for some time to come. And in this act Harry Poole has shown his personality; he has exemplified what is known as "appreciation," for all who know him will join with the Evening Herald in testifying to the fact that Mr. Poole is a man who appreciates most deeply his friends and supporters.

Yes, he could have built a cheaper house, but he has enjoyed an excellent business here for a number of years, and when he came to the forks of the road in deciding the kind of structure the new play house was to be, that appreciation of the public asserted itself, just as his love for his friends asserts itself in his daily life, and he erected an edifice that thrills every citizen with intense loyalty and admiration.

Mr. Poole has set the pace for others who have prospered in this community. He believes thoroughly that the community which supports a business is entitled to something in return. He can find no common ground with the man who wants to take everything out of a community and return nothing. Upon this principle he has acted in his theatre investment, and the Herald sincerely hopes that his lead will be followed by others.

If such should be the case we may expect more magnificent buildings to replace those that are out of date and unsuitable for this growing city.

On the 17th day of January Klamath Falls will celebrate the opening of Poole's Pelican Theatre—the finest possible to build—and it will be a gala day for this city—a day that everyone will long remember.

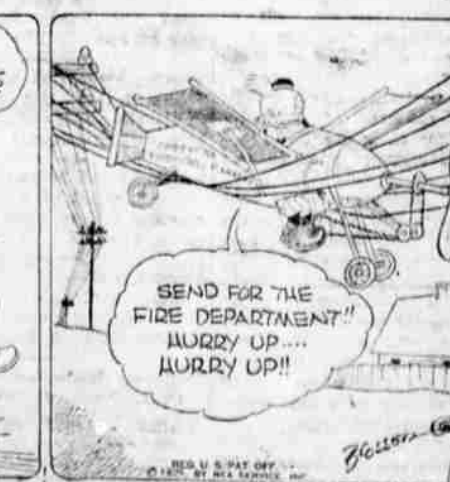
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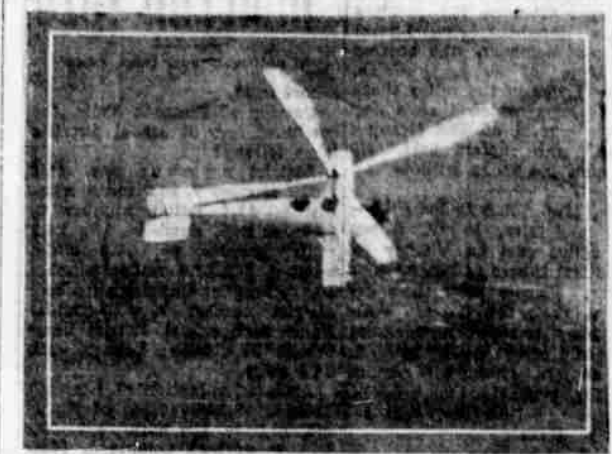

Autogiro Again Tries Its "Wings"



Here you see the American debut of the "flying windmill," invented and successfully tested in Europe with a flight across the English channel. The autogiro—that's its real name—whirled up and down for two hours over Plover Field, Philadelphia, carrying the three men shown below: A. Banks, left, Philadelphia pilot; Arthur Rawson, center, of London, who brought the machine to America; and J. Faulkner, Atlanta flyer. The 25-foot fans rotating on a vertical shaft, take the place of the ordinary airplane wings and allow the craft to rise and descend almost vertically.

Modoc County Deer Protected From Onsets of Ticks, Lice

ALTURAS, Calif., Jan. 2.—As a protective measure for the mule deer in game district one and three quarters, A. A. Jordan, deputy fish and game commissioner for Modoc county, is putting out a sulphur salt for the animals in an effort to destroy ticks and lice which have attacked the deer during the past year.

Hunters during the fall reported that many of the animals were literally covered with the pests, and in each instance the deer were very poor as a result. The fish and game commission has been attempting to find some method of eliminating the infestation, and the sulphur salt is being used as an experiment.

It is hoped that during the winter months by the use of the sulphur salt the animals will be put in good condition and that they will be able to rid themselves of the insects.

Jordan is putting the preparation in places where it will not be found and used by cattle. The places where salt is being placed has not been announced as it is feared game violators might visit the salting places for the purpose of killing the deer.

A check will be kept on the success of the experiment with the sulphur salt, and, in case it is found to be beneficial, the practice probably will be continued in the future by the commission.

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SUN SHINES ON 6 DAYS DURING PAST 31 DAYS

Just six days during the month of December did Old Sol shine in Klamath Falls, the rest of the month was cloudy. Thirteen mornings found the city shrouded in a dense fog.

This was the weather report filed at the Southern Pacific for the last month of 1928.

Total precipitation for the

month was recorded at 4.89. During the month 12½ inches of snow fell, the heaviest fall being on Christmas eve when 6 inches fell from early evening until Christmas morning.

The minimum temperature for the month was 3 degrees above zero. The maximum was 52 degrees above.
