DRUGS CAUSE GOTHAM CRIME CLAIMS MAYOR

James J. Walker Gives Ideas on Subject in Special Article

NEW YORK, Jan. 2. (AP)—Mayor James J. Walker, in a copyrighted article in the New York American today gives the use of narcotics as one of the chief causes of crime in the metropolis.
He also asserts that New York is relatively the least crime-ridden city in the country when its millions of inhabitants is compared with the size of other communities.
While wrong doing in other communities is minimized by their local newspapers and not published in metropolitan papers, the mayor says, similar occurrences in New York are given nationwide publicity giving the city a reputation of being wicked.
Young men, who under proper conditions would be useful, law-abiding citizens, Mr. Walker writes, are turned into gunmen and gangsters by a handful of gang leaders who feed them drugs to undermine their moral fibre and to gain an ascendancy over them.
The mayor said the World War, which lowered the respect for human life, also had contributed to present day lawlessness.
