

FRED HERRICK BANKRUPT, SAYS HIS CREDITORS

Involuntary Petition Filed
Against Noted Lumber-
man in Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 3. (AP)—The Spokane Review says today that an involuntary petition in bankruptcy will be filed Thursday or Friday against Fred Herrick, former millionaire lumber operator. Herrick recently assigned all his properties to his creditors, to whom he was said to owe between \$1,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

According to the Spokane Review a business board appointed by the creditors had been hopeful of keeping settlement of the lumberman's tangled financial affairs out of bankruptcy court, but were unable to do so when three banks refused to release preferred claims they secured when the Fred Herrick Lumber company of Oregon was sold.

The three banks together with the amount of their preferred claims were: The Exchange National Bank of Spokane, \$45,000; First National Bank of Chicago, \$125,000 and the Baker Furniture Bank of Chicago, \$131,000.

Other creditors of Herrick said that they resented the efforts of these banks to secure such large blocks of cash, and would prefer that all creditors share alike when Herrick's affairs became such that a pro-rata distribution could be effected without preference. The money had not been paid the three claimants, but suits for its recovery undoubtedly would be instituted by the banks, creditors said.

Herrick recently assigned all his properties, which include lumber and other operations in many parts of the United States to his creditors.

like a rational human being, he said. Forgetting friends, engagements, work, obligations and other things of genuine importance, the victim of adrenalin becomes as an animal, possessed by a consuming desire to engage in conflict and to take great chances. "Men who are not greedy or avaricious or pugnacious become within two or three hours almost like a pack of famished wolves fighting over a carcass," Dr. Dorsey explains. "And it is a real fight, not personal, of course, but a fight for possession, a fight to ward off defeat."

"Adrenalin is released into the blood stream. Under its magic drive, heart and lungs speed up and additional psychological fuel is supplied to our fighting-fleeing-talking mechanisms, thereby increasing their efficiency at the expense of our viscera. The viscera quiet down, we cease to feel hunger even though the stomach be empty; but we fight harder, run faster."

"That is the kind of drug adrenalin is—a crisis remedy; it drives us to become less human, more animal. A fight is a crisis. A poker game is a fight."

Dorsey cites numerous instances of victims of adrenalin losing all they possessed at cards, roulette, horses or some other means of gambling, unable to check their passion to continue the game as long as the stakes were available.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The contortions of modern dancing, and the growing demand for such performances in choruses, have shortened the life of the chorus girl in England until "she is too old at 25." That's the opinion of J. W. Jackson, manager of famous dancing troupes.

"The pace is so hot that frankly one can say that chorus girls are too old at 25," he says. "When they become 25, they make excellent wives because they have had to rough it and they have had also to economize. Some weeks they live in luxury—others are spent in poverty—which gives them the right sense of proportion."

Six of Jackson's chorus girls have taken up the luxury angle for good. That number have married millionaires and multi-millionaires.

DENIES PARDON TO 2 SLAYERS

Governor of Louisiana
Refuses to Follow Re-
commendation

BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 3. (AP)—Governor Huey P. Long refused tonight to commute the sentence of Ada Bonner Le Bouef and Dr. Thomas E. Dreher, and they will hang Saturday afternoon for the murder of the woman's husband.

In declining to extend executive clemency as recommended by the state board of pardons, the last hope of the doomed pair apparently vanished. Mrs. Le Bouef will be the first white woman to be hung in the history of Louisiana.

Governor Long reviewed the case in a 12-page statement, and declared that he was not sure what part Jim Beadle, trapper companion of Dr. Dreher who is now serving a life sentence for participation in the killing, played in the murder. But that he felt certain that Mrs. Le Bouef and Dr. Dreher were the real murderers.
