Sleeper Busses

WHILE aviation enthusiasts continue to lay plans for transcontinental train service, the motorbus people are quietly going ahead and making the task of crossing the continent by bus much more pleasant and comfortable.

Sleeping-car busses are now coming into service on the long transcontinental run. Furthermore, the bus line operators report that business is picking up. For all the fact that the bus is noisier, bumpier and slower than the railroad train, it seems to be finding an increasing measure of public favor.

The Chinese Market

AN ARTICLE in the current Magazine of Wall Street emphasizes the enormous potentialities of the Chinese market as a field for American exporters.

There are 400,000,000 people in China. The vast majority of these people, at present, use almost nothing that does not come from their own vicinity. But the new regime in China, seeking to rehabilitate the country, have great plans for raising its economic level. They are now projecting a \$10,000,000 road building program, and hope it will be merely the first step in a general awakening.

It is easy to figure out the tremendous demand for goods that will come if these 400,000,000 Chinese are lifted even slightly in the economic scale. American industrialists who are prompt in cultivating the Chinese field stand to reap huge dividends a few years from now.

Our War With Japan

WE haven't heard quite so much in recent years about that American-Japanese war that was accepted as inevitable a short time ago. Somehow, the impression seems to be gaining that the Japanese sincerely want to be friendly.

A little dispatch from Tokio the other day told how the new Mikado reviewed his fleet. In the line of 180 fighting ships were eight "capital ships"—battleships and battle cruisers armed with huge guns. They made a magnificent, warlike spectacle.

But in 1919 the late Mikado reviewed his fleet, and there were 21 capital ships in line. All but eight have been scrapped under the Washington treaty. It does look as if Japan really meant her protestations of friendship. No nation with hostile designs would throw away 13 battleships.

New Tunnel Expedites Northwest Railroad Schedule

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 5.—The fastest passenger train schedules ever put into effect between Portland and Spokane and Seattle and Spokane will be inaugurated by the Great Northern railway January 13, following the opening of the new 8-mile tunnel east of Seattle.

All Great Northern trains, both east and west bound, beginning on that date, will make the run between the coast cities and Spokane in 10 hours, as compared with the present schedule which required from 11 to 12 hours.

English Cops Trailing Down Colony Germs

LONDON, Jan. 5, (UP)—Scotland Yard was on the trail of "millions of influenza germs" tonight after Dr. M. R. Brady had informed authorities that there was danger of wide-spread illness in case glass culture tubes, which were stolen from him, were broken and the germs released.

A number of the tubes were stolen today when Dr. W. M. Grotton, bacteriologist, left them unguarded in Brady's automobile. No trace of the thief had been found at a late hour.

"If the tubes are broken there is undoubtedly danger that the contents will cause an influenza epidemic," Brady said. "The cold weather probably would kill the germs if they were exposed to the air but in warm hands or indoors or in a warm atmosphere the germs would survive and multiply."

BODIES OF 11 BANDITS HUNG ALONG ROAD

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 5, (UP)—Eleven bandits were executed near Aguascalientes today when they were caught preparing to wreck a train from Juarez, according to the newspaper Grafico's correspondent.

The bandit leader, Melton Espinosa, was one of those executed, the advices said.

The bodies of the bandits were hanged from telegraph poles as a warning to others.

PAIR OF SKIS GIVEN CONVICT
