FOOTBALL STAR TITLE WINNER; DEFEATS LEWIS

Gus Sonnenberg Butts His Way to Championship of Heavyweights

BOSTON, Jan. 5, (AP)—Wrestling had a new champion today—"Dynamite" Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth football player, almost a novice at the game. Sonnenberg won the heavyweight mat title when Ed "Strangler" Lewis was disqualified in their match here last night. Sonnenberg had taken the first fall with his "flying tackle" in 9 minutes, 46 seconds, and when they returned to the ring, he tried to drop the champion again with the same tactics.

Lewis Punched Hard
The rugged football player, who after college, continued his gridiron career with the Providence Steamrollers, a professional team, butted Lewis seven times in rapid succession, forcing the champion to fall or crawl outside of the ropes to escape punishment.

Each time Lewis sought safety outside, he was ordered to return by referee Leon Burbank. The official gave Lewis a warning and, after the seventh but, counted him out of his title which he turned over to Sonnenberg to the great delight of the 20,000 spectators who filled the spacious Boston Garden.

Sport Elevated
Many of the seatholders were persons of prominence and thousands of them were young college graduates and students, a faction which became interested in wrestling because of Sonnenberg and one whose patronage moved sport out of a dingy Boston hall into one of the largest sport palaces in the country.

The decision, which stripped Lewis of his well-earned championship belt as well as his title, drew the vociferous protests of Billy Sandow, the "Strangler's" manager and confidant. Sandow claimed that his man was never entirely out of the ring, and that he had at least a foot or leg inside at all times and that Lewis was willing and eager to continue the bout when he was counted out by Burbank.

Sonnenberg On Offense
During the bout, which lasted 38 minutes and 5 seconds, Sonnenberg was on the offensive at all times and had to force matters to stir the cautious Lewis into action. When the "Strangler" did get going, he tried for victory with a series of headlocks, all of which Sonnenberg broke or slipped free.

Lewis received \$25,000 for his night's work. Sonnenberg's share ran about \$5,000. Total receipts exceeded \$72,000.

JACK DEMPSEY MUST FIGHT TO REGAIN TITLE

Suggestion of William Muldoon Meets With Little Favor

CHICAGO, Jan. 5, (AP)—The National Boxing Commission will not recognize Jack Dempsey or anyone else as heavyweight champion until he wins the title in the ring.

Concerning the proposal of William Muldoon, veteran New York boxing commissioner, that Dempsey be recognized immediately as the champion, Paul Pahn, president of the N. B. C. said:

"The National Boxing Association is not in favor of naming champions in the heavyweight or any other class until they win recognition as such in the ring. What would be the purpose and what would the sportsmanship amount to if commissions named champions without their coming through to win them?"

"While I believe Dempsey is an outstanding heavyweight prospect, yet I see no reason for naming him the heavyweight titleholder now. Let him show the world he earns it and that he is the best man in the heavyweight division today."

JOHNNY DUNDEE NEARS END OF FIGHT CAREER

Fights Game Battle With Rosenberg; Schmelling Beats Sekyra

NEW YORK, Jan. 5, (AP)—The end of the road, a long and honorable way that has wound through fisticuffs for over eighteen years, appeared today in the slant of Johnny Dundee, brave little warrior who has fought them all, and was once a champion in both the featherweight and junior lightweight divisions.

At times Johnny baffled the rugged Rosenberg, ten years his junior and five pounds heavier, with the lightning left hooks, the bounding footwork, and cagey swapping at close quarters that made him famous. A few times Dundee tried his old trick of bounding backward into the ropes, leaping forth again to spear his opponent off-balance.

But last night this maneuver, a trick Johnny himself invented, was just a slow-motion exhibition of how it used to be done. Beaten About Body.

Although Johnny was beaten solidly about the body at times at long range, where he once was invincible, the Scotch-Wop had the satisfaction of flooring Rosenberg for no count in the sixth round with a right to the chin, thus adding in perhaps his final engagement, to the reputation he has always borne for light hitting.

The main bout, overshadowed in sentimental interest at least by the battle of the former champions, added more impetus to the surge of the young German heavyweight, Max Schmelling, who easily trounced Joe Sekyra, blonde Bohemian from Dayton. Schmelling, who is almost a duplicate in appearance of Jack Dempsey—the same cast of countenance, lowered black brows, long slim muscles, and bobbing
