STATEWIDE interest in the coming exhibition of rare Chinese paintings to be shown at the Oregon Museum of Fine Arts is already noted, and the display, which will include five canvases from the Sung period (960-1277) is expected to draw the attention of art lovers from all parts of the Pacific coast. The exhibition will be ready at the beginning of the winter term of the University of Oregon, it is announced by Mrs. Murray Warner, director of the museum.

The shipment of paintings has just been received by Mrs. Warner direct from the Orient, and in addition to being extremely rare, is very valuable. The Sung examples were selected for Mrs. Warner by Dr. John C. Ferguson, who has long been recognized as an outstanding authority on Oriental art. He and Mrs. Warner are warm friends, due to their natural interest in the Far East.

Two Sung paintings now in the museum of fine arts will be added to the display, when it is opened to the public. When told of these, Langdon Warner, curator of the Fogg Museum of Harvard, showed keen interest. He is also a student and lover of Oriental art. Two Yuan period paintings, (1277-1368) will also be included in the exhibition.

A certain number of the paintings in the group just received will become permanent property of the Oregon Museum of Fine Arts, Mrs. Warner says. The Murray Warner collection of Oriental art at the university has already attracted national attention, and many of its objects rank in importance and value with those found in other noted museums of the country. The collection has been built up through the efforts of Mrs. Warner, who is an ardent internationalist, in also the donor of the Murray Warner essay contest prizes for essays on the Orient.

Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University, Burt Brown Barker, vice-president, and other university officials are expected to be present at the opening of the coming display of the newly received paintings. Date of the exhibition will be announced in a short time, it is stated.

Household Suggestions

To remove a tight glass stopper, apply a cloth wet in hot water. Rub around the outside and hold it over the spout of a boiling teakettle.

When sweet milk is rather old and you wish to heat it, add a little lime-water or soda and it will prevent its curdling. It can then be used for cooking purposes.

Bath tubs may be cleaned by putting a little turpentine on the cloth with scouring powder. Rub it on any stains, and they will come off immediately.

For warm night clothes for children, a pair of full sized white blankets without a border will make two night suits of the style which have long sleeves, long legs and feet, and button from the neck down to the waistline in front. These blanket night suits cut to advantage and are warm and inexpensive.

If salt fish is soaked in sour milk before cooking, the delicate flavor will be brought out.

Figs and dates given to children in place of candy will help keep their systems in good physical condition.

If cheese is wrapped in a cloth moistened with vinegar and kept in a covered crock, it will not dry so readily.

If bottles containing flavoring, extracts and seasonings are not kept tightly corked, the contents will lose their flavor.

SIDE TRAINS.

Dipping skirts on evening gowns show a preference for greatest length on one side, usually the left. The other side dips also, but the left side may reach beyond the floor, providing a sweet little train.

THE WOMAN'S DAY

IT is true, isn't it, an Ruth Steele Brooks points out in the current "North American Review" that a generation ago society piled "the poor working girl," whereas today it's the married stay-at-home housekeeper who gets the pity and patronization while broadsides are fired by such big guns as Henry Ford or Carrie Chapman Catt to the effect that the world of science and industry must consider the needs of the housewife who is the most exploited of all living creatures?

"Things have reached a point," writes Mrs. Brooks, "where one must be in a profession of some sort to be able to hold up one's head among feminine friends. The fact is that we housekeepers are, to a great extent, the victims of a wrong psychology, of a sort of inferiority complex, to use that threadbare expression."

"We are apt, in this utilitarian age, because we are the recipients of no weekly or monthly check, to esteem too greatly the work of those who are. But the fact is that when the two fields are analyzed, the homemaker is still doing the more important part of woman's work. The fact is that the good housekeeper of today is in the advance guard of the present educational trend."

"Is the homemaker's profession not a composite of many of the professions which women pride themselves on practicing? Doctor, nurse, dietitian, chemist, chef, modiste, economist, teacher, interior decorator; these are but a few of the housewife's lines—any one a reputable calling?"

I become a little weary of outbursts by married women insisting that their job is entitled to all respect, and equally weary of outbursts by maiden ladies insisting that though but a vegetable could be content with the unstimulating drudgery of the life domestic. Each one is rationalizing to her own satisfaction the state in which she finds herself, and her own isolated individual experience can never be universal nor have any meaning to the world of women in general.

And with all due respect to this particular housewife-writer's contention that housewifery is worthy of lead place in the professional procession, just how many housewives recognize this?

TOO SMALL FOR JOB. The whole trouble with the restless stay-at-home wife is not so much that her job is too small for her but that she herself is too small for the job and utterly unable to put into it what it could use.

I know any number of married women who have an inferiority complex towards their job, not because of what is said to them about it, but because they themselves know they are flunking on it; are utterly untrained for it, and rather than snap into the situation and master it, prefer to take the line of least resistance and reach out for the typing or clerking or teaching of filling job which they do know.

This is no attack on them. Merely a protest at the Mrs. Brooks who say that professional and business women outside the home make the home women feel inferior.

The thing boils down like this. When married women do their job as well as business women

they will be given credit accordingly. But, though it takes bravely to say it, what every business woman knows is that if she uses the same inefficient, slow, lazy methods in her job that thousands of wives use on theirs, she wouldn't draw her pay envelope a second week.
