

FRANK SEXTON OUTLINES CLUB WORK FOR 1929

County Leader Organizes Various Organizations in Klamath

With the feeling that the year 1928 witnessed a successful year in his work, County Club Leader Frank W. Sexton is busily engaged preparing for club activities for the ensuing year.

An idea of the success experienced during the past 12 months may be gained by the figures of 346 one hundred per cent completions out of 385 young boys and girls undertaking the courses. Of course that does not equal the record of 1925, when every boy and girl who signed up for county club work finished one hundred per cent.

In general the club work will be conducted along the same lines as last year. Following are the different clubs to be organized: Home making, sewing, canning, cooking, calf, potato, garden, poultry, rabbit and livestock judging.

Mr. Sexton is now busily engaged in forming 1929 clubs and getting work outlined for the ensuing year. He is devoting his attention first to the organization of girls' clubs.

DUKE NICHOLAS SUCCEUMBS AT ADVANCED AGE

Ex-Commander-in-Chief of Russian Armies Dies Sunday Morning

ANTIBES, France, Jan. 7. (A.P.)—Grand Duke Nicholas, who commanded the Russian armies in the World War and was a claimant to the Russian throne, is dead at the age of 72. His last words were in a speech to his servants exhorting them to remain faithful to their true Russia. He died Sunday morning.

The Grand Duke came here from Paris last November to seek a more temperate climate. Pneumonia developed from what was apparently a trivial cold.

The Grand Duchess, who was Princess Anastasia of Montenegro, Prince Andrew of Russia, Princess Hattenberg, Grand Duke Peter of Russia and his wife, and the Duke of Leuchtenberg were present when the end came.

Elected Successor
After the rise of the Bolsheviks, the Grand Duke was elected successor to the throne of the late Czar Nicholas by the supreme council of Russian monarchists, representing several million Russians living in exile.

The Grand Duke escaped numerous attempts made on his life. Soon after his appointment as commander of the Imperial Guards an attempt was made to shoot him during a military review. At another time, a bomb was found on a railroad track over which his train was to pass. In 1907, a train in which he was riding was shot at. The next year a number of bombs were found in the vicinity of his palace. In the same year, seven terrorists were hanged for an attempt on his life. Two years later, a revolutionary plot against his life barely failed.

YOUNG EMPLOYEE SUSPECTED OF DOUBLE MURDER

CANAL FULTON, O., Jan. 7. (A.P.)—A young farm hand, known only as Edward, was sought today in connection with the slaying of John Oser, 30, well-to-do Canal Fulton farmer, and his wife, Bertha.

The bodies were discovered yesterday morning by the Oser's six-year-old son, George.

432,000 Jars Vicks Now Produced Every 24 Hours

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7. (A.P.)—Police Corporal James R. Muldoon was near death early today in a hospital here as a result of a shotgun wound inflicted when he walked into an automatic trap while approaching a still in the Excelsior district here.

Police Chief Quinn rushed to the scene with reinforcements from police headquarters. Reports to the central station said the posse had dismantled the traps, finding a rifle and a shotgun set up on blocks with wires attached to the triggers so that any one tripping over the wires would be shot.

BEGIN WORK ON FREMONT ROAD

Work on 12.25 Grading Contract on La Pine West Project Starts

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Jan. 7.—Work on the 12.25 mile grading contract on the Fremont highway from LaPine to the west forest boundary is under way. C. W. Wauzer of the state highway department at Bend, announces.

The contractor, William Endicott of Madras, has his machinery on the job having used it in grading the 8 mile section within the forest boundary, recently completed.

The first work of the Endicott crews will be that of clearing the right of way of jack pine and yellow pine.

Indians Need Cash, Claims Women's Club

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 7. (A.P.)—The Indian service of the United States needs an annual appropriation of \$25,000,000 instead of the present \$12,000,000, declares the General Federation of Women's clubs.

Through the chairman of its division of Indian welfare, Mrs. Joseph Linton Smith of New Hampshire, the 2,000,000 club women of the organization have sent a letter to Herbert M. Lord, director of the budget, regarding needs of the Indians.

Mrs. Smith has been connected with the New Mexico and eastern associations on Indian affairs for a number of years and has visited various schools and agencies. She reports that the Indian service needs more hospitals, doctors and nurses and that tuberculosis is on the increase on many reservations.

"Many families are living on dirt floors in improperly ventilated houses," she reports, "and in crowded conditions that result inevitably in the transmission of tuberculosis and other diseases. These homes are a direct contributing factor to the high death rate among Indians. They should be repaired and rebuilt. New homes should be built for young married couples now forced to live with relatives. There should be a quart of milk supplied to each Indian school child each day, as well as fresh vegetables and fresh fruit."

NEW LAWS FOR IRRIGATION TO BE DISCUSSED

Associated Districts Will Hold Session Next Saturday Afternoon

A meeting of the associated irrigation districts of Klamath has been called by R. S. Hopkins for next Saturday, January 12, in the office of the Klamath Irrigation district in the county court house.

Purpose of the meeting is to consider the final draft of the program of changes in the irrigation law that has been passed by the Oregon reclamation congress, and to consider any later suggestions of changes in the law that may be offered by the officials of any district. Whether or not delegates will be sent to the legislative assembly will also be discussed.
