BIG BLOCK OF SEWER BONDS ARE PURCHASED

Portland Concern Successful Bidder; Council Holds First Session

The American National Trust company was the successful bidder for \$150,000 worth of Klamath Falls sewer improvement bonds—the first half of the \$300,000 sewer bond issue—when bids were opened by the city council last night.

This money will finance the construction of the first two units of the sewer project. Contracts for the first units was let to the Shea Plumbing company. Gil Shea of Portland is in charge of the work.

New officers were inducted last night. They included U. S. Ballentine, police judge Mrs. Lena Dennis, city treasurer; William Butler, councilman for third ward; Clifton Richmond, councilman for fourth ward; T. B. Waters, mayor; J. E. Van Camp, fifth ward councilman; Francis Olds, first ward councilman; and Paul Lambert, second ward councilman, who were re-elected last election day, were also inducted.

Following an address of W. C. MacKen, commander of the World War Veterans, the council voted the approval of the proposal to establish an armory in Klamath Falls. The question was referred to the judicial committee.

Bids Submitted Reports on the city organization were made. The city fire department reports that 15 calls were made throughout the month of December. The police department reported on the number of arrests for the month closed.

Bids on furnishing gasoline and tires for the city equipment and vehicles were submitted and read to the council for their approval. Bids were turned over to the finance committee who will determine to whom the bids shall be awarded. The matter of C. P. Clark operating a rooming house without a license, and without sufficient protection provided against fire was discussed. Clark will be brought before the judge in the near future. While Clark applied for a license he had operated the rooming house before acquiring it, the place not being protected as the law requires for fire protection.

To Invoice Property Three local restaurants sent in bids for the feeding of the prisoners of the city jail. The bid of the "K Cafe," owned by Mr. Kenoffel, was the bid accepted.

Mayor Waters called for an invoice of all city departments to be prepared by the heads of those departments to be ready at the next meeting. These invoices will be kept on file in the offices at the city hall for future reference. It was also decided that new equipment for the office of the police judge will be needed soon.

Application for business houses for the year 1929 were made. Most of these included taxi stands, pool halls and barber shops. They were all turned over to the police committee for reference.

gambling, or playing of cards for money, will be made. Officers keep a continual check on this matter but much closer surveillance will be enforced. It was possible and quite probable that the owners of these institutions are unaware of the fact that gambling is going on. Several complaints have already been made to the police department on this matter it was stated.

Ordinance Passed A proposed new ordinance for the city was read and accepted whereby the city books will be audited by Allan Sloan, accountant, and for the city of Klamath Falls. A contract will be made with him to that effect. All the finances will be audited for the business year which closed December 31, 1928. The ordinance was voted on and passed with no negative votes.

Another ordinance was read and discussed but not passed which deals with the hauling of garbage. The order read that no firm or corporation can haul garbage for others, within the city, without first receiving a city franchise. Any violation of this act would be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$50 or not more than 30 days in jail. This does not deal with private property owners.

The third ordinance read was laid aside for future discussion. It dealt with the removal of snow from sidewalks in front of business houses on Main street between Conger and East Main streets. The snow which is left on the sidewalks endangers the safety of pedestrians and also automobiles, has become a nuisance. It was thought. It was stated that managers or owners of the property should be held responsible to see that the sidewalks on their property should be kept clean of all accumulations of such kind. However,
