

## EIGHTEEN DIE AS GOLD WAVE HITS MIDWEST

### No Relief In Sight For Stricken Area; Chicago Shivers

CHICAGO, Jan. 8. (UP)—Eighteen deaths in the middle west and the southwest were attributed Monday to a record cold wave that swooped down from Canada, blocking roads in many states and impeding railroad transportation.

No relief was in sight for the stricken area. The government weather bureau here predicted still lower temperatures.

A winter tornado accounted for the deaths of six persons at Bay City, Texas. A twister at Washington, Ind., caused no deaths but left undetermined property damage.

In the Chicago area the thermometer wavered around zero after a fall of more than 25 degrees in 24 hours. The lowest temperature here today was three degrees below zero. Eight degrees below was forecast for tonight.

Minneapolis and St. Paul shivered while the bottom dropped out of the thermometer. The mercury worked down to 17 below and threatened to go lower.

While the surrounding district put on its furs and "heavies," Medicine Hat, Sask., the reputed birthplace of cold waves and blizzards, enjoyed temperatures well above the zero mark.

## Thug Has Hot Time; Wounded By Policeman

OREGON CITY, Jan. 8. (UP)—There is one bandit at large in Oregon tonight who has had more experiences in a single day than the average desperado has over a period of years.

The fugitive is suffering from a bullet wound, probably in a leg, and despite two safe robberies, a restaurant holdup and a gun battle, he has only a few groceries to aid his getaway.

A posse is out hunting for him. His pal and alleged accomplice is in jail.

It happened this way. Early this morning two men knocked off the combination of the Oregon City Laundry safe. They found no money. They turned their energies to the safe of the Taylor-Winans garage. The result was equally discouraging.

They became bolder and more desperate. They invaded the Star restaurant. Money was cached in the restaurant, but they failed to find it. They bundled up groceries and provisions and started to hunt new fields of endeavor. Patrolman Otto Miller saw them leaving the restaurant. A gun battle ensued in which, Miller said, he fired four shots in the air to frighten the bandits into submission. When the thugs returned the fire he shot toward their legs.

One, who gave his name as Floyd Rinflesch, surrendered. Miller ran out of ammunition.

The second bandit ran out of sight through the railroad depot, leaving a trail of blood and flourishing his pistol.

Miller called out the police and fire departments, but the bandit had not been found last night.

the strain when their masters were keen to drive on and on, were waiting an official diagnosis of their ailments that forced the ending of the record-smashing endurance flight.

Just what happened aboard the Question Mark forcing it to descend was described in casual language by the aviators after they reached the ground. "As I left the controls at 1 o'clock in the afternoon," said Quesada, "Captain Eaker took the wheel and the left motor went dead. We sent Sergeant Hooe out on the catwalk, but his weight was too heavy in the unstable condition of the Question Mark. We knew then that the flight was over. We dropped the gas within two or three minutes after we had taken it."

"That was not the first flight trouble. Saturday night we thought it was all over. All three engines lost their power. That was fouled sparkplugs. We were all ready to end the flight but finally we cleaned that up. But it was worse than spark plug trouble this time. It looked like valves. Shortly after one o'clock the right motor began to weaken, then we knew the flight was about to end."

"Our last two refuellings were on two engines," said Captain Eaker and we knew we were through. "The left engine had gone dead. We were at an altitude of 4,000 feet but we dropped 2,500 feet on the turn. We signalled Hooe to get back. On two engines we couldn't keep our altitude, and got ready to land. The right engine began to show similar to the left and we found we were really depending on one engine."

"We knew we were coming down then. The ship began settling and it was just a question of where we would land. It settled 2,500 feet in two and a half minutes. It takes about an hour to regain that much. We had no trouble in making the field. The second motor seemed to have had plugs."

expense of the taxpayers? And second, is an airport a public enterprise which can be supported by taxation?

Chief Justice Coshaw's opinion quotes a statute enacted in 1925 and declares it is so clear it needs no interpretation. This provided that "any incorporation city or town of this state shall have the right to appropriate any private real property, . . . for general use and benefit of the people of said city or town, including real property, for an aviation field or park."

At some length the opinion holds that "an airport owned by the city as a community, and not of any particular individuals therein," and that it is therefore a public enterprise.

## BIG VOLCANO IS ERUPTING

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It was believed that hundreds of homeless persons had fled to the mountains to escape the lava flow and low hanging clouds of gases.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Jan. 8. (UP)—Mount Cal Boco, volcano, which had slept restlessly for the last quarter of a century, spouted flame, lava and ash from three craters Sunday morning and spread terror in "the Switzerland of South America."

Advices from Llanquihue province, where the volcanic peak is located beside Lake Llanquihue, were meager due to interrupted communications but a message received at Puerto Varas said five bodies had been recovered. Reports said the dead and injured were taken to Puerto Varas.

## LOVELY VALLEY IS DESCRIBED

and taken off the latter part of September. Gains for this period ran from 250 pounds to over 400 pounds, or a two-pound daily gain or better on grass alone.

Dairying is also gaining in importance and at the present time approximately 300 head of cows are found in this valley. Due to the abundance of clear, cold water, milk of particularly high quality can be produced and the large part of the present production is sold as retail milk in Klamath Falls, Chiloquin and other towns. Any surplus is usually sold as sweet cream and is generally retailed as such as used in the manufacture of ice cream.

Considerable premium is paid for the milk and cream.

Pasture conditions throughout the summer are ideal. The pasture is a mixture of native grasses, alfalfa and other clovers. Irrigation is particularly easy, simply requiring the diversion of the various streams. A few canals have been constructed, carrying the water to various points of the valley. Cost of irrigation is almost nothing.

The water supply is uniform throughout the season and changes hardly at all year after year. Crater Lake, situated 2000 feet directly above the valley, is thought to have some effect on the uniformity of the Wood River Valley water supply. For those who desire recreation, the Wood River Valley affords plenty, with fish in its streams, ducks and geese in its meadows and marshes, and deer, bear and other game in the surrounding hills.

Due to the large holdings, development in the Wood River Valley has not kept pace with

that of the southern part of the Klamath basin. Ranches involving thousands of acres are still the order of the day, making it rather difficult for diversified farming to secure a foothold. Dairying, although still in its infancy, is helping to bring this about, inasmuch as greater acre returns can be made from dairy products than from beef production. Also, little has been done in the development of forage crops for winter feeding, another important factor in the development of diversified farming. With the development of a good leucum hay, root crops and grain hay for winter feeding, making it unnecessary to purchase concentrates at a high figure as at present, and with the increase in carrying capacity of summer pastures by cultivation of the older pasture and the introduction of new clovers and grasses, no doubt the future will see wonderful development in the Wood River Valley.

With the many natural advantages now enjoyed by this district, it is not unreasonable to suppose that in the future the Wood River Valley and Fort Klamath will be known far and wide as the center of production of the highest quality of dairy products.

The final development to speed the progress of this section has come in the new Cascade division of the Southern Pacific railroad, which traverses this district and affords rail outlets for its products. The improvement of the Central Oregon highway, known as The Dallas-California highway, which is an all-year road, has also encouraged settlement and also made the hunting and fishing possibilities more available. It is a sportsman's paradise as well as a cattleman's paradise.
