Who Is Intelligent?

THE Pennsylvania Education Association at a recent convention urged legislation "limiting the voting privilege to those who can exercise it intelligently."

The assembled teachers pointed out that when the functions of government were simple, little education was required to exercise the duties of citizenship. Now, however, government is complex, and only an intelligent electorate can handle it properly. Hence the need for restriction.

Unfortunately, however, there are objections to their plan. How would we put such restrictions into effect? Is there any evidence that the highly-educated man really votes more intelligently than the man who never finished high school? Isn't it quite certain that this scheme would prove an admirable instrument of disfranchising any discontented section of the electorate that the upper classes feared?

The Pennsylvania teachers may be given the prize for advancing the most impractical solution to our governmental problems seen in many a year.

A \$4000 Bribe? No?

DESPITE the prevalent talk about graft and bribery, there are still plenty of honest, conscientious men in our law enforcement departments.

In New York the other day a patrolman came upon two men unloading a mysterious-looking truck into the cellar of an apartment house. Suspicious, he went over to investigate. One of the men came forward and offered him \$4000—a good deal more than the patrolman's entire yearly salary—to "take a walk around the corner for five minutes."

This policeman refused to do it—although it could have been done without any fear of detection, and although the bribe offered was immense. Instead he went ahead with his investigation, found the truck loaded with whiskey, and arrested the men involved.

It's comforting to read of such things, in this day when corruption is almost taken for granted. All of us owe a little debt to that upright officer. He has helped us to sustain our faith.

A Harsh Decision

THE ACTION of a Philadelphia judge in finding a purchaser of liquor guilty of conspiracy might have far-reaching effects if generally adopted by our courts.

There are, in this country, countless "law-abiding" citizens who think nothing at all of conniving at law by patronizing bootleggers. They are quite safe; if the transaction comes to light it is the bootlegger's hard luck, not theirs. They keep their respectability and go unpunished.

But if arrests, stiff fines and jail sentences were apt to follow on the purchase of a bottle of whiskey these people might change their attitude.

It is hard to see why anyone should protest against the Philadelphia judge's decision. After all, it takes two men to break the liquor law—one to sell and one to buy. The buyer is doing just as much to break down the law as the seller. If he is made to pay a penalty he hasn't much kick coming.

Relief For The Aliens

THE Foreign Language Information Service points out a task with which the present Congress might well busy itself—the providing of relief for the thousands of American residents of alien birth who, due to cumbersome laws, are classed as "illegal entrants."

Before our immigration restriction laws became effective in 1921, entering the country illegally was not considered a serious offense, and thousands of immigrants came in without being examined by immigration inspectors. These people, many of them thoroughly Americanized, now find they cannot become citizens because our immigration records do not list them. They cannot be deported, so they remain people without a country.

Secretary of Labor Davis has recommended that Congress remedy this situation by making these aliens eligible for citizenship. It is to be hoped that Congress can find the time and the inclination to do it.

RAILROAD WILL RELAY STEEL

Falls-Sprague River section was completed.

The only remaining units of construction to make the project complete, are the re-laying of steel, completion of a telephone line to Bly, the construction of fences along the right-of-way and the construction of a station at the present terminus in Bly.

"Present steel will be removed and new and better steel laid," Mr. Bogue said this morning, "however the present ties will remain. Except in instances where the ties are apparently in poor condition, it would be poor business to scrap them. They are comparatively new and will serve the purpose."

"Cold weather has hampered development work along the line. The only construction projects under way include the building of a telephone line—which will be completed to Sprague River in the near future—and the construction of fences along the right-of-way between Sprague and Bly."

"Tri-Weekly service is now in effect, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. This spring daily service will be inaugurated; how early in the spring will depend largely upon how soon logging operations begin in eastern Klamath."

"Livestock corrals have been constructed at Bly and several shipments have been made from Sprague River valley to Klamath Falls over the O. C. & E. railroad. Our extra gain is down to 20 men now. When the weather opens up it will be increased as additional construction projects merit."

Extension of the O. C. & E. railroad and its general improvement have led to the building of two log lines from Bly into large tracts of timber—one by the Pelican Bay Lumber company, in process of construction, and the other by the Evans Box company. These two concerns will log extensively in eastern Klamath and will haul all of their logs over the O. C. & E. railroad to their respective mills.

Bennett that Keyes "needed the money" to pay off gambling debts and buy a new home.

The jury will be locked up for the remainder of the trial. That order was given yesterday by Superior Judge Edwin I. Butler, following Fitts statement, and after charges of jury tampering had been made on the opening day of the trial.

Keyes, acting as one of his own attorneys replied to Fitts statement "It is one thing to make these allegations in a statement and another to prove them. I am positive the evidence will not bear them out."

Ed Rosenberg, not a codefendant in the bribery case, paid Keyes \$125,000 for acquittal. District Attorney Bureau Fitts said Jacob Berman had promised to testify, in his opening argument yesterday.

Richardson testified that Keyes had said as the Julian trial was closing: "I am not telling you what to do in your closing argument, but I want you to know what I'm going to do. I am not going to try to convict Ed Rosenberg and Lewis Berman."

Lewis Berman, a defendant in the stock over issue case, is a brother of Jacob Berman, who the state declares will testify against Keyes, Rosenberg, Jack Rosenberg, Charles Reimer, and Ben and Dave Gettoff.

Richardson testified that he refused to join with his former chief and pleaded with the jury to convict all the defendants.

R. G. Fowler, county agent of Jackson county, declared that abortion was more to be feared among dairy cows than tuberculosis.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Jan. 10. (AP)—Advices from Tyn on the Jugo-Slav frontier today said that three Bulgarian peasants had been killed by Serbian frontier guards. The peasants had been visiting relatives in the village of Strazimirovci on the occasion of the Orthodox Christmas with regular permits. The village is half Serbian and Bulgarian.

LORD BURGHLEY MARRIES TODAY

LONDON, Jan. 10. (AP)—Lord David Burghley, son and heir of the Marquis of Exeter and famous hurdler and Olympic champion, and Lady Mary Scott, daughter of the Duke of Buccleugh, were married this afternoon in the old time church of Saint Clement Dances on the Strand. The occasion was the first society wedding to be solemnized on the Strand in many years.

JOHN D. FIGHTS COL. STEWART

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. (AP)—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has sent letters to stockholders of the Standard Oil company of Indiana seeking their proxies for the annual meeting of the company in March to oppose the re-election of Col. Robert W. Stewart as chairman of the company. It was learned today.

Mr. Rockefeller requested the resignation of Mr. Stewart after he was charged with perjury in connection with his statements to the Senate Teapot Dome committee. Mr. Stewart declined to resign, and was acquitted of the charge on Nov. 29.

In his letter to stockholders, Mr. Rockefeller, who is a large stockholder in the Standard of Indiana, outlines his letter to Col. Stewart which sought his resignation last year, and adds "definite assurances have already been given me by stockholders representing a substantial amount of stock of the company that they are opposed to Col. Stewart's re-election."

LIQUOR BLINDS YOUNG WOMAN

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10. (AP)—Mrs. Thelma Sanford, 19, said to have been a former federal agent, lay in a hospital blind today—a victim of poison liquor.

Three men, John Lavender, Robert Kelly and Tom Meyer, who said she drank "white mule" with them in Meyer's apartment Sunday had been questioned by police and released. They were searching for a bootlegger named Jack, who delivered the moonshine at the party. All four drank the liquor, police say, and the men were not affected.

The girl's sister, Mrs. C. R. Burns of El Paso, Texas, who arrived here yesterday, said that she and Mrs. Sanford had been employed by the United States custom service in Texas and in Phoenix, Ariz., to detect rum smugglers, and that their lives had been threatened.

TEX'S ESTATE ESTIMATED AT ABOUT MILLION

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. (AP)—Tex Rickard left an estate valued at "over a million," Jack Dempsey revealed today after a conference with lawyers handling the promoter's affairs. He said the will would reveal bequests to Rickard's widow, infant daughter and his mother.

Dempsey said that the will provided \$50,000 in cash and all Rickard's personal property for the widow, with an adequate bequest for his aged mother, with the rest of the estate, when several minor bequests are taken care of, going into a trust fund for the young daughter, Maxine.

ration for a distance of nearly half a mile in all directions. Visible canals of the sticky mass. Engineers wallowed hip deep in the mud as they directed the men laying high pressure pipes for cementing the neighboring wells and crews in tractors and scrapers battling the creeping clay.

The present, double-barreled gusher fire is the fourth destructive blaze in the Santa Fe Springs district in as many months. Getty number 29 opened up with a roar of 200 foot flames when it blew in late yesterday ignited by the flaming General Petroleum well number 1450, which had burst into flames when it blew in earlier in the day. The second well showered a mile square area with a coat of mud when it blew in.

The two burning wells are but 200 feet apart, with many others near them. Engineers say the closeness of the wells caused the second one to ignite. Getty number 29 blew in after the out-rushing gas from the other relieved the pressure, and thirty minutes later, both had joined in a roaring blaze.
