AUTO CHECKING PLAN PROPOSED FOR JUNCTION

Sheriff Jennings Suggests That Every Car Be Stopped

ASHLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—Establishing of a car "checking station" preferably at the Klamath Junction, where all out-state cars would be stopped for registration and checking, is to be sought by Sheriff Ralph Jennings, as a means of crime prevention and apprehension of criminals, according to announcement made today by Sheriff Jennings.

Sheriff Jennings, in explaining his plan, said that he had discussed the matter with T. A. Rafferty, chief of the traffic force, and others, and that he would attempt to finance the project, either through getting legislative action or "through the governor somehow."

He said it was his plan to establish a 24-hour checking service, which would mean the employment of six men—four at the station at all times, with two on active duty.

The plan is almost identical with the plan which is now in operation near Dunsmuir, Calif., where every out-state car passing the checking station is stopped.

Asked whether the out-state car registration for southern Oregon would be taken over exclusively by the checking station officers, Sheriff Jennings said that this was his plan as he could see no reason for stopping cars on the highway for checking license and ownership, and not registering the cars at the same time.

Sheriff Jennings said that under the checking system, which is meeting with the approval of insurance companies, he was confident that car stealing in southern Oregon would decrease, as would the game of booze running over the Siskiyou.

LET CONTRACT FOR BIG DITCH

A contract has been let to Haskins Brothers to excavate a ditch 25 feet wide and one mile long, which will bring excess waters from the over flow of Sheep Creek, by the directors of Lower Klamath Lake Grazing association.

This creek covers in the neighborhood of 6000 acres in the northern lake bed to the southern part of the lake bed, which is lower and was becoming desert for want of irrigation, there being a slight obstruction between them.

It is thought this will dry several thousand acres in the northern part earlier in the spring and favor more pasture to grow, while this surplus water should irrigate more land in the south end and help produce more pasture.

"It was hoped that the association would be able to secure from the Klamath river at the railroad headgate all the water needed, water which in the early spring flows to the ocean with out doing any good," A. L. Andrieu stated. "However the Klamath Drainage District thru which the water must pass, has refused so far the permission, afraid that it might injure their lands. It is hoped that the ditch which is to be built will demonstrate that the association will be able to take care of a certain amount of water from the Klamath River, without further injury to the Klamath Drainage District lands."
