WOOL MARKET REMAINS QUIET

Few Sales of Consequence Are Reported by Commercial Bulletin

BOSTON, Jan. 11. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The market has continued quiet, on the whole, during the past week, although a few sizeable sales have been made. Medium wools are very strong, while fine wools are no more than steady. The foreign markets are very strong everywhere and rather against the buyer's whole.

"Contracting in the west appears to have ceased with 39 cents the extreme price paid in western Colorado for medium clips. All told not over 1,500,000 pounds have been contracted in the west.

"The manufacturing position is sound but quiet, interest now centering on the coming opening of heavyweight lines.

"Mohair is quiet but fairly steady both here and abroad."

BAY BRIDGE IS NEW PROPOSAL

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Jan. 11. (UP)—Privately owned toll bridges along the state highway system would be acquired by the state and the financing of a bridge across San Francisco bay would be made possible through legislation that will be submitted to state lawmakers at their present session here.

This announcement was made today, with the information that B. B. Meek, state director of public works, and John J. O'Toole, city attorney of San Francisco, are working on such a measure.

The plan is considered of utmost importance here, for it would mean taking over by the state eventually of all bridges now operated by private capital. Earnings from the operation of these bridges would be used for retiring bonds issued for their purchase, and paying interest.

CATCH KILLER; ADMITS CRIME

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11. (AP)—As the outcome of what he said was a death pact in which he was to kill his former wife, and surrender for execution by the state, Garland Williams, 28, World war veteran who saw service in Siberia, today faced a charge of murdering Mrs. Lorraine Ambrose last Saturday. Her body was found Sunday.

When arrested in a hotel yesterday, Williams held out his wrists smilingly for the handcuffs, and police said he confessed killing the woman, assuring them that he would have

given himself up as soon as he had wound up his affairs.

"You fellows got me before I was quite ready," a detective quoted him as saying. "It doesn't matter though, because I am ready to die. She's waiting for me, and there won't be anybody to come between us over there."

Pulver said Williams' words were the preface to one of the most amazing confessions they had ever heard, in which the prisoner vowed he killed his former wife because she was unable to live without him, but himself elected to be hanged because he objected to suicide. Williams said he had separated from his wife because of trouble caused by a "friend."
