

RICKARD WILL MADE PUBLIC

Leaves \$50,000 in Cash
and Much Property to
His Widow

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (AP)—The will of Tex Rickard, to be filed this afternoon by the New York Trust company, executors, does not reveal the exact valuation of the estate, which Jack Dempsey said yesterday would amount to "over a million."

The will provides bequests for Rickard's widow, daughter, mother-in-law, sisters, nieces and nephews and the income from \$25,000 to Edith May Schultz, cousin of the first Mrs. Rickard.

It is dated March 13, 1928. It is understood that the estate includes property in Boston and Miami Beach, Fla., securities in South American corporations and brokerage accounts and bank deposits in New York and Florida.

To the widow, Mrs. Maxine El-Hot Rickard, the sports promoter left \$50,000, his real property in Florida and all his personal effects, automobiles, household goods, furniture, books, pictures, and silverware.

After providing for various relatives Rickard's will provides that all the remainder of his estate, real, personal and mixed be held or invested and the income to be paid to his daughter, Maxine Texas Rickard. Upon his daughter's marriage or reaching the age of 25 years, the will provides that one quarter of the principal be paid to her and upon reaching the age of 35 years another quarter is to be paid.

DOPE PEDDLER SENTENCED TO ELEVEN YEARS

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (AP)—Joseph Unger, agent of a narcotics syndicate believed by federal officials to have been financed by Arnold Rothstein, slain gambler, was sentenced today to serve eleven years and six months in Atlanta penitentiary.

Unger had pleaded guilty to possession and transportation of narcotics.

Deschutes County Election Quiz Ends

BEND, Ore., Jan. 11. (UP)—Deschutes county's district attorney election dispute between Ross Farnham, who was elected, and George R. Brewster, defeated candidate, ended today by an out-of-court agreement.

The contest ended when Brewster and Farnham reached an agreement that the case should be dismissed without cost to either party.

Brewster had charged violation of the corrupt practice act and had demanded a recount in nine precincts. Only preliminary motions and demurrers had been heard.

GIRL SLUGGED DURING NIGHT

PORTLAND, Jan. 11. (AP)—A search was being made today for a prowler who slugged Miss Cora Hill, 19, into unconsciousness in a hallway of the Woodlark office building here last night. The girl was unconscious for several minutes. On regaining her senses she screamed and employees of a restaurant on the eighth floor made a search of the building, but the attacker had escaped.

LATEST FIRE ALARM FOUND

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 11. (A.P.)—Discovered—a one-man traveling fire alarm! The man is Gene Brown, who files the night air mail between Atlanta and Richmond. Gene, far aloft, spots a fire. Then he swoops down just over the building, his wide open motor roaring an alarm. He has acted in this new capacity three times in two weeks.

Seek to Exclude Filipino Workers

SEATTLE, Jan. 11. (UP)—Strongly influenced by Victor Nazareth, a Filipino, Seattle's labor council has started a move to urge congress to enact a law excluding Filipinos from the United States.

"If there is to be trouble, it is best that we are excluded," said Nazareth. "But give us our independence." Nazareth is a University of Washington student. Labor men declared Filipinos are crowding white men from industrial fields.

SOUTHERNERS SEEK TARIFF

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. (UP)—Proposals to grant southern producers of raw materials protective tariffs brought protests today from New England manufacturers who might have to buy these raw materials instead of similar ones from abroad.

This situation, which has been repeated several times with slight variations in the opening week of the congressional tariff hearings, brought critical comment from Representative John Garner, democratic leader from Texas, that farms and mines in the United States were entitled to protection just as much as the factories.

In the hearing many southern

requests for tariff protection, mostly on farm products, the democrats on the ways and means committee conducting the hearings manifested restlessness over the flood of manufacturers' requests for more protection, mostly from the north.

"Seems like the more protection you get and the older your industry is, the more you want," Garner told one witness, referring to the original function of the tariff to protect "infant" industries.

Proposals for tariff changes on the clays used in paper-making, on gypsum, important building material, and on mica, extensively used in automobiles and radio, took up most of today's session.

YOUNG COUPLE THOUGHT SLAIN

British Columbia Residents Ask Police Probe of Mystery

PORT HARDY, B. C., Jan. 11. (AP)—A belief that Leonard Davis, 18, and Geraldine Daroch, his 19 year old companion, were murdered and the launch in which the couple left Port Progress for Port Hardy, December 31, looted, has led residents of Port Hardy to request the Provincial police to probe the mystery.

Davis had 175 in a small pouch along with other mail matter and this was missing when the wrecked launch was found on the shore near Port Progress. Miss Daroch's sweater coat and one of her shoes were found on the deck of the wrecked launch and a number of articles which the launch carried were missing.

SALJEM MAN DIES

BANDON, Ore., Jan. 11. (AP)—O. R. Burns of Salem died in a hospital here today from injuries suffered Wednesday when his automobile went off a grade on the Roseburg highway near here. He received internal injuries. H. R. Gustafson, also of Salem, was injured but will recover. Burns' body will be taken to Salem tonight.

WOOL GROWERS HOLD CONCLAVE

Note of Optimism Heard in Addresses of Leaders Today

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 11. (AP)—The annual convention of Oregon Wool Growers association opened here today with more than 100 attending. Talks by leaders of the group sounded a note of optimism.

The growing cooperation between the sheep and cattle industries was commented upon by Mac Hoke of Pendleton, in response to welcoming address by William Dobby, secretary of Cattle association.

Reports of President K. G. Warner and Secretary W. A. Holt, reflected the spirit of optimism. The sheep and wool industry in Oregon now represents an investment of fifty million dollars with an annual payroll of fifteen million, speakers declared. The convention will close with a banquet Saturday evening. Wool men are here from as far east as Omaha.
