

PROPOSALS FOR CHECKING RUM RUNNING HEARD

Canadian Commission Will Submit Report to Government

OTTAWA, Canada, Jan. 11. (UP)—American proposals for tightening the border guard against liquor smugglers "will be reported to the government" by Canadian representatives who concluded late today a conference with a United States delegation under Admiral F. C. Billard of the coast guard service.

Otherwise, the apparent failure to reach an agreement on suggestions that Canada refuse clearance papers to vessels exporting liquor and bound for the United States remained unchanged on the fourth and last day of the conference. The Canadian representatives had repeatedly countered American suggestions that such action was the only possible way to check the rum runners.

"It was made clear by members of the United States delegation," said an official statement issued after adjournment of the informal conference, "that while certain improvements would be desirable in the method of exchange of information provided for under the treaty of 1924, particularly in the way of insuring more exact identification of the craft engaged in rum running, no appreciable results would be obtained except by action on the part of Canadian authorities in refusing clearance papers to vessels or other permissible papers in connection with the export of goods, the entry of which is illegal in the United States."

The Detroit-Windsor border was mentioned as especially needing such regulations.

"The administrative officials of the United States, members of the American delegation to the conference," the statement said, "expressed themselves as firmly convinced that no further or additional or regulatory provision made by Canada, short of a refusal to issue documents permitting exportation, would have much, if any better success than those which have been tried out since the anti-smuggling treaty between the two countries was signed in 1924."

As regards commercial smuggling into Canada, it was stated by the Canadian representatives that since the reorganization of the preventive service with its augmented border patrol, commercial smuggling had been reduced to a negligible amount.

"All members concurred in the view that the conference had been of much value in eliciting a cordial and frank exchange of helpful information."

CHICAGO HOTELS IN FIGHT AGAINST PHONES

EPIDEMIC HITS GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 11. (AP)—Severe winter weather is being accompanied by grippe and influenza in Scotland, Germany and the Balkans.

One out of every fifteen inhabitants of Berlin was estimated today to be suffering from grippe. Hospitals and private clinics were being taxed to the utmost and their staffs had been depleted through illness.

Between ten and fifteen per cent of the city's police force, railway workers, and street car and motor bus employees were on the sick list. Five to ten per cent of the staffs of the larger department stores were absent from work.

Motor ambulances were so overworked that they were able to transport only the worst cases. It was thought that it might be necessary to use schools and other public buildings for temporary hospitals unless the epidemic abated soon. The city health department said, however, that the death rate had been comparatively low and professed not to be alarmed.

After ten days of severe frost there has been a serious outbreak of influenza in Glasgow, Scotland. Thousands have been taken on ill and these included many public service workers.
