

MAN WHO SHOT UNION FARMER GOES ON TRIAL

Partner Was Convicted of Killing Man on White Horse

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Jan. 12. (UP)—The trial opened here today of Fred M. Black on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Leonard V. Olsen near Lostine September 25.

Black was accused jointly with Harry Newberg, convicted Thursday of manslaughter.

Black's defense is expected to be that he fired a single shot several moments after Newberg tossed three bullets at the figure passing in the dark woods.

Olsen was riding a white horse. It was found that the slain man had fallen from the horse at about the point where the horse had been when the first shots were fired, according to testimony in the Newberg trial.

Today coroner C. L. Booth and sheriff A. B. Miller told of being called to the hunters' camp on Lostine River and finding the body of Olsen on the ground nearby.

CANADA NAMES DIPLOMAT

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 12. (UP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced tonight that his government had recommended the appointment of Herbert M. Marshall, prominent notary of Montreal, as Canadian minister to Japan. When the appointment becomes effective Canada will have diplomatic representatives in four capitals—Washington, London, Paris and Tokyo.

TUNNEL OPENS THIS MORNING

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years. Previously five years was good time for such a project. Unlike the four European tunnels which surpass it in length and the six-mile Moffat bore in Colorado, its American rival, the Cascade, is lined from end to end with two-foot walls of concrete.

The new route through the granite rock will eliminate 18 miles of winding track and six miles of snowsheds. It cuts 500 feet from the height to which trains had to climb to pass through the now discarded three-mile tunnel.

The new bore runs from an elevation of 2,247 feet at its western end to 2,887 feet on the east.

STORM BREAKS IN OKLAHOMA; PROBE ORDERED

Governor Will Be Investigated by Legislative Committee

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 12. (UP)—A far reaching investigation of Oklahoma's government was ordered today by the house of the twelfth legislature.

The lower chamber appointed a committee of thirty members to examine affairs of any or all officials and departments. The inquiry is expected to start next week.

The resolution directed the committee to investigate all charges of incompetency, willful neglect of duty, habitual drunkenness, corruption and acts involving moral turpitude.

The action is expected to settle finally the political storm which has raged about the administration of Governor Henry S. Johnston.

It is the beginning of the final act in theatrical politics as played in these parts since the Democrats elevated Johnston from a county seat lawyer's office to the executive chair, accompanied by Mrs. Mamie Hammond, his confidential secretary.

The main attack, subdued a year ago when the administration repulsed an extra-legal impeachment session by troops and court opinions, again centers on the pair. They have met it with a minority group in the legislature.

Today's action served to strengthen claims of insurgents that this session would result in the governor's removal.

Meanwhile, concerted efforts were made in the senate to investigate rumors that money played in adjournment of the special session a year ago.

An additional resolution on the matter was introduced, seeking to subpoena Carl Magee, editor of the Oklahoma News, Scripps-Howard newspaper, as first witness in the inquiry. Magee wrote of hearing rumors of bribery a year ago.

The legislature adjourned today until Monday.

IS CHINESE "LINDY"

SHREVEPORT, La., Jan. 12. (UP)—Major Tien Lai Huang, known as the "Lindbergh of China," announced here today that he still is planning a trans-Pacific flight from San Francisco to China. The Chinese aviator announced here several months ago and later in San Francisco, that he would accompany Col. Charles A. Lindbergh on an attempted Pacific flight.
