actions of the Oregon public service commission in dealing with the telephone company are "inadequate." The public service commission, however, is not held directly responsible by the committee for the asserted freedom from regulation enjoyed by the telephone company.

"Because of the small compensation and a mass of routine work that must be gone through" the report said, "the commission does not attract men of ability and experience. An investigation of the telephone company taken before this group would be vain and unprofitable."

Legislation permitting cities to fix and regulate telephone rates, services, methods and practices is urged.

"It is clear, the committee concludes, that telephone rates in Oregon are too high."

Under the heading, "objectionable business practices," the report lists fixed and arbitrary charges for service from which the public benefits little.

The practice of the Pacific company of demanding payment in advance for telephone service was rapped by the investigating company.
