To A Given Point

RALPH BUDD, president of the Great Northern railroad, possesses the energy to get somewhere. When it was proven to him by his engineers that the stupendous task of tunneling the Cascade range in Washington state was an improvement that would produce earnings over a long period of time, he sanctioned the work and started what is the biggest tunneling project in the nation. It required an investment of 25 million dollars, but it took sixteen miles off the length of the road and leveled the grades so that ordinary engines could handle heavy trains to the coast. The saving is such that interest on the 25 millions can easily be paid and in time the improvement will pay for itself.

This is where men of vision and ability to do things count in present day business. Budd is conservative, but he is geared to go; he slumps down at nothing; he realizes that things which seemed impossible but a few years ago can now be accomplished—the huge tunnel is one of those things.

And the result is that the tunnel is opened for traffic and the Great Northern enjoys easy grades and shorter distances which permits it to compete in a most happy manner with other northern railroads to the Pacific coast.

After all, any institution is only as large as the man who directs it. Great wealth can be placed behind a "dumb-bell" and failure will follow. On the other hand the of the Budd type do not worry so much about the capital. They first find a sound proposition and the needed wealth to construct it is easily obtained.

The great tunnel is a monument to Ralph Budd. Some men would be willing to quit with such notoriety, but Mr. Budd is a young man. He has only fairly begun his career. Watch for many such undertakings from this man who walked over the hills of Klamath county years ago and determined at that time there should be more railroads here.

"Crime Doesn't Pay"

IT IS extremely trite, and sometimes it isn't quite true, to say that crime doesn't pay; but every now and then something happens to indicate that the old saying is pretty generally valid.

In the New York courts the other day appeared one George C. Parker, for years tabbed as "the aristocrat of crookdom." He had been a confidence man for years. Twice he "sold" the Brooklyn bridge to unsuspecting strangers. He used to be known as one of the best dressed men in New York. For a long time he was a heavy spender and a gay liver.

But when he came into court he didn't look as if any of those things had been true. He was old, shabby and discouraged. He was arrested for cashing a worthless check for \$150—a sum that would have been small change for him once; and since it was his fourth offense, he was sent to prison for life.

Crime doesn't pay—at least, not always.

It is the slow-poke who causes to break out of traffic lanes in an effort to make reasonable time; and this breaking out of traffic lanes causes nobody knows how many accidents. On all busy streets he should be eliminated; and if, as in New York, there is no law to cover his case, one ought to be passed, pronto.

U. S. REFUSES TO ABSORB BIG GERMAN ISSUE

France and England Must Buy 60 Per Cent of The Bonds

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15, (UP)—Europe's hope that American investors will assist in solving the old world's reparations problem by purchase of large quantities of German reparations bonds depends primarily upon British and French ability to absorb at least 60 per cent of the issue, the United Press was informed today.

There was still no official confirmation here of reports that J. P. Morgan had been selected to serve on the reparations expert commission, although announcement is expected at any time.

The U. S. government has determined, it was said, that American investors, if they are offered the bonds at all, shall not assume the major share. A division of the bonds which gave Europe few and the United States many bonds would be viewed with grave apprehension in Washington because such an arrangement would relieve the allies of the great stake which they now have in German recovery. The United States would assume that stake and the allies would gain a freedom of action with respect to Germany which they cannot enjoy so long as they hold billions of dollars worth of German pledges to pay.

STEWART WINS VALUABLE ALLY

President Seubert for Colonel in Fight Against Rockefeller

CHICAGO, Jan. 15, (UP)—President Edward G. Seubert of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana in a statement last night came out openly on the side of Colonel Robert W. Stewart in the latter's fight with John D. Rockefeller Jr., for control of the \$750,000,000 Indiana oil corporation.

"I shall cast my votes for the re-election of Robert W. Stewart," Seubert's statement said. "I so informed Rockefeller several months ago, and there has never been the slightest doubt as to my attitude. Any intimation to the contrary is without any foundation in fact."

Seubert added that the board of directors was unanimous in favor of Stewart.

Navy Officer Defendant In Large Lawsuit

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15, (UP)—Sult to dispossess the commandant of Mare Island navy yard of 700 acres of land on adjacent island No. 1, will be entered in San Francisco tomorrow by Edmund Burke, attorney, for James E. O'Connell, Los Angeles oil operator, the lawyer announced today.

The state of California received from the government a present of 700 acres of swamp land, the property in question, in 1850. This land was later sold and eventually was purchased by O'Connell.

Following this transaction, the area was seized by the government. A patent to the property was obtained by O'Connell in 1912, it was claimed.

For the past sixteen years the matter has been under a litigation. O'Connell now hopes to repudiate what he claims as his property from the commandant of the island.

OLD QUESTION TO BE SETTLED

Roman Problem Will Soon Be Relegated to Problems of Past

ROME, Jan. 15, (UP)—An agreement for settlement of the long standing Roman question, as reported exclusively by the United Press last week, probably will be announced by the Vatican. The late Marquis Dohoglio Barone, who died January 4, was instrumental in bringing about the agreement, a draft of which is now on the desk of Pope Pius. The draft makes the pope sole arbiter of the time and form of an official announcement of the agreement, it was understood.

According to the draft a section of territory near the Vatican will be ceded to the Holy See. It was stated authoritatively in diplomatic circles. The pope would have nominal sovereignty over the inhabitants of this territory, although the Italian civil authorities would retain civil administration.

Between 11,000 and 15,000 persons would thus come under sovereignty of the pontiff.

The Holy See also would receive indemnity for church property confiscated by the government.

DR. E. H. KINDER IS EXONERATED

Police Say Dentist in No Way Responsible for Mrs. Ruth's Death

WATERTOWN, Mass., Jan. 15, (UP)—Dr. Edward H. Kinder, Boston dentist, in whose Watertown home Mrs. George Herman Ruth, wife of the Yankee home-run king, was suffocated to death last Friday night, was in no way connected with her death or responsible for the conflagration, Chief of Police John Milmore told the United Press early last night, after a conference with the dentist.

"I am satisfied that Dr. Kinder had no connection with the fire or with the death of Mrs. Ruth," Chief Milmore said after the conference, which took place at police headquarters here.

FIGHT STARTS OVER POST OF POET LAUREATE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15, (UP)—Friends of two of the state's leading poets were engaged in verbal conflict last night that threatened to increase in proportion until it would present state legislators with a problem demanding exceptional diplomacy.

Indignant members of the artists' colony at Carmel-by-the-Sea, unanimous in raising the banner of their favorite, Robinson Jeffers, made many statements from those who were endeavoring to have Henry Mead Bland designated poet laureate of California.
