PACIFIC FLEET OFF TO BATTLE

Will Meet Atlantic Ships Near Canal Zone in Practice "War"

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Jan. 15. (UP)—With a "war" declared between the Pacific and Atlantic naval forces, the Pacific group was to move on the Panama Canal today from bases at Los Angeles and San Diego.

Fifteen thousand men said their goodbyes yesterday as a final preparation for sailing were made, anchors were weighed at 10 o'clock this morning.

The U. S. S. California, admiral William V. Pratt's flagship, will lead the battle line of eight other super-dreadnaughts of the Pacific fleet. With this armada will sail the new naval aircraft carriers, Lexington and Saratoga, landing bases for 200 observation, scouting and bombing planes which will precede and form the flank guards of the fleet.

Off San Diego the destroyer division of 36 units, with the light cruiser Omaha as flagship, three submarine divisions and the aircraft carrier Langley will join the line.

The Atlantic force is expected to be encountered by the 80 Pacific ships somewhere off Central America after passing through the canal. Air engagements will precede the combat of water craft by some hours.

PORTLAND COPS TO FACE JURY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15. (UP)—An investigation which may result in corruption charges against Portland policemen will be started here by the district attorney's office, the result of a story told by a 21-year old girl who confessed being an inmate of a disorderly house.

The girl told investigators a number of such disorderly houses were existing through police protection. She said she had seen policemen accept protection money from the landlady of a hotel.

The girl also said she knew of two girls, one 14 and the other 18 years of age, who were inmates of disorderly houses.
