

Bowring Band Will Play On Opening Night

"A stroll in Melodyland." That is the title of the act the Jack Bowring and his ten-piece orchestra, known as Klamath Falls' own, and rated as one of the best orchestras in Oregon, will present at the opening of Poole's Pelican Theatre tomorrow night.

Before the Orpheum acts begin the curtain will be raised to reveal the entertaining jazz band in a setting that is in keeping with the music and equal to the famous settings of the Orpheum circuit itself.

Bringing the metropolitan touch of higher orchestra music to the audience, Jack Bowring and his orchestra will for about fifteen minutes purvey the latest and best in popular numbers.

Opening with "Then Came the Dawn," with appropriate lighting effects, the band will feature the original Brunswick arrangement of Red Nichols and his Five Pennies. "Ida, Sweet As Apple Cider," following which will be featured "Baccaratte Berney," a travesty from "Tales of Hoffmann's," light opera.

The closing kick of the act will be the featuring of "Original Dixieland One-step," played in a most modern style.
