

FAMOUS TENNIS STAR TO MARRY F. S. MOODY JR.

Parents of Helen Wills Announce Betrothal Quietly

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 16. (AP)—The engagement of Helen Wills, world's amateur women's tennis champion, and Frederick S. Moody, Jr., son of a San Francisco capitalist, has been announced formally by Miss Wills' parents, Dr. and Mrs. Clarence A. Wills of Berkeley.

The engagement has been rumored persistently since 1925, when Miss Wills was playing tennis on the Riviera and Young Moody and his father stopped there while touring Europe. The young folks were much together then.

The reports of the engagement were consistently denied, however, and only last week Miss Wills contradicted such a rumor, saying announcement of her engagement would come from her parents, not from the newspapers. The announcement did come from her parents in a brief note mailed to the bride-to-be's friends yesterday. Moody, who is at present employed by a stock brokerage company in San Francisco, gave up college for the sea.

DEMPSEY WILL TRAIN LIGHTLY

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 16. (UP)—Jack Dempsey indicated last night that he would begin light training here within two weeks but he would not say whether he would return to the ring.

Dempsey appears to the layman to be in excellent physical condition, and his weight is only about twelve pounds in excess of his best fighting weight.

His road work at present consists of running between appointments pertaining to the coming Sharkey-Stribling fight here February 25.

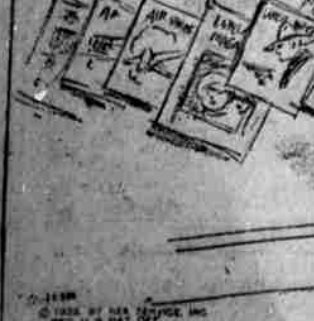

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 16. (AP)—With final details of the heavyweight boxing bout between Jack Sharkey and Young Stribling already settled, plans went forward here today for pre-flight arrangements with Jack Dempsey in charge of operations for the Madison Square corporation.

W. L. Stribling, Sr., father-manager of the young Georgia fighter, signed articles yesterday for his son's participation in the fracas.

Sharkey, the Boston gob, already has signed for his part, and nothing remains now except what the promoters say is the real work—the perfecting of those hundreds of little odds and ends in plans and arrangements.

The fight will be a posthumous of the brain of Tex Rickard, who died here recently, and who had planned the fight for his Miami Beach kennel club.

Dempsey is acting in the role of his late pal, Tex.

White Sox May Come Back to Regain Lost Prestige; Lena Blackburne Is Now Manager

CHICAGO, Jan. 16. (AP)—For the first time since the "Black Sox" scandal of a decade ago shattered a mighty baseball team, it appears as though the Chicago White Sox may be something more than just a doormat for other teams of the American League in the 1929 pennant race.

Strengthened by several minor league "Big Berthas" and led by a manager of the old school, Russell "Lena" Blackburne, the White Sox will put a young but fast and dangerous outfit in the field.

With an array of rookie material and veterans from last year's fifth place club, Blackburne's problem is who to discard. Only Willie Kamm, leading defensive third baseman of the junior circuit, finds his position uncontested. There are nine candidates for the outfield, four for second base, three for catcher, and two each for shortstop and first base, in addition to a small army of prospective pitchers.

Of the score of rookie hopefuls, four stand out—"Dutch" Hoffman, an outfielder obtained from Sacramento for \$25,000 and Earl Sheely, J. C. Watwood, a hard hitting outfielder from Shreveport; Johnny Kerr, 23-year-old second base sensation of the Coast league who is up for his second trial in the majors, and Bob Welland, a southpaw obtained from Moline of the Mississippi Valley league. Welland

plucked the last game of the season for the White Sox last fall and shut out the Athletics 1 to 0.

Second base, a weak spot since the days of Eddie Collins, has four applicants in Kerr, Earl Swenson, a rookie, and Bill Hunsfield and George Rodern, who alternated at the position last season.

Bill Cissell, the "\$125,000 cavalryman," will be at shortstop again unless Irvine Jeffries, who comes from Dallas, beats him out. Blackburne is figuring on taking the "punch" out of Cissell's hitting, changing him into

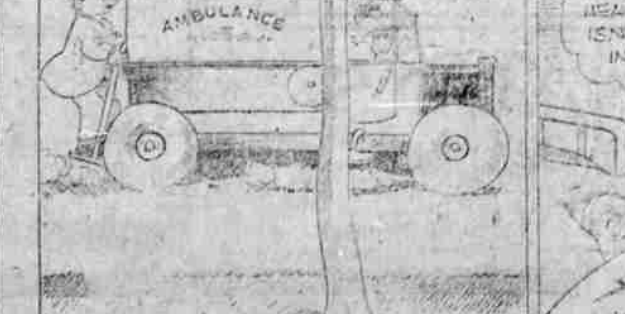
Collima grew stronger each round. In the fifth he put Langford down for a count of five.

How to avoid serious after effects

1. If You Have Had Flu
