Tully, who was sued for divorce by his wife last September on a charge of cruelty, alleged in the cross complaint that she confessed her misconduct to him a month after the incident.

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THRILL SLAYER GOES ON TRIAL

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 16, (UP)—George Harch sat facing a jury in Fulton superior court today and calmly listened to testimony that may send him to the electric chair for a "thrill murder" last fall.

Proceeding with the grim business of convicting the 19-year-old college student, Solicitor General John A. Hoykins drew forth almost unintermitted testimony from nearly a dozen witnesses and is expected to complete his case Wednesday morning.

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
