Brothers, Louis and Charles, are to appear with a big company. They are introducing their latest eccentric creation, "Doing a Break."

These boys originated an entirely new kind of dancing a few years ago which took Broadway by storm and they are as popular a pair of male dancers as New York applauds. London also knows and likes them.

Their dancing has so far been inimitable on account of the originality, strength, speed, grace and even humor necessary. The foundation of their original steps is a heredity secret. For 250 years the Mosconi family have danced. The great, great, great grandfather was a ballet master for the royal court of Italy. In every generation that followed there was a dancer. The present Louis and Charles' grandfather had a ballet school in Milan, their father, who came over here, a school in Philadelphia. Their mother was not only a dancer but also a famous skater. Louis and Charles could skate and dance ballet, or classic, or modern steps from the time they were five and do acrobatics too. From their perfect development comes their great strength which brings ease in motion and their artistic grace.

One of the most successful of last season's legitimate productions was Hayard Veiller's "Trial of Mary Dugan." It was, as many will remember, the story of the trial of a extremely pretty chorus girl for murder. As a matter of fact the trial comprised the entire play, all the action took place in the court room. It was a thrilling and moving murder unraveled before your very eyes by attorneys, witnesses, judge, prisoner, and all the paraphernalia of the law courts.

There now appears in vaudeville, as a part of the dancing Mosconi Brothers, Big Revue, a perfectly hilarious, and utterly devastating travesty upon the aforementioned opus of Mr. Veiller's. Twists and tricks and wine-cracks reduce the trial to a vastly funny burlesque in which a murder trial finally dissolves into a gambling game, and in which the judge smokes cigarettes and asks questions out of turn.

One of the vaudeville's favorite comedy teams, the beautiful Helen Broderick, of "Polles" fame, and Lester Crawford, in a hilarious offering written by themselves. This team has rolled up a long score of successes since they met in "Jumping Jupiter," a musical comedy. In it Lester Crawford was playing the comic juvenile and Helen Broderick was in the chorus. Crawford said to her one day as they were waiting in the wings: "If you can make a little laugh in dressing rooms the way you do, you can make other people laugh and get paid for it. Let's make a team and clown together through life."

So they were married and have appeared together practically ever since. They were featured in Elsie Janis' "Puzzle," in Sam Bernard and Willie Cottle's "Nitties," and last year Helen appeared alone with Beatrice Little in "Oh, Please." In between musical comedies they have played from coast to coast in Keith-Albee-Orpheum vaudeville.

Atos and Darling, two very clever comedians offer "Who? Me," a zippy fast moving act that is entirely in keeping with the rest of the show. "Who? Me?" should extract from the

most blasé a hearty chuckle and cause him to remember the entertainers for many moons. Supplementing the Orpheum program are several fine features including the showing of "Synthetic Sin" starring Colleen Moore, Jack Browning and his ten musicians present mirth and harmony, and they know how; Rex Stratton, long associated with other de lux playhouses and engaged to play the big Warlitzer organ will do several feature numbers and display his worth as the real musician he is. The augmented Pelican Theatre orchestra will render selections and presentation numbers under the able direction of Harry Borel.

of the motor license fees has been the only topic of major legislative importance to get under way. The absence of Representative Corbin, chairman of the Property Tax Revision committee, has delayed introduction of the heavy tax bills until next week.

The 151st bill, the only one introduced during this morning's session, comes from Mettaker of Columbia county and seeks to protect school districts in their vested property rights by making it impossible, as under the present law, for any combination of school districts to divest some other school district of its high school and remove it to some other school district. The bill amends section 5299 Oregon law as amended by Chapter 72, General Laws of Oregon for 1925.

The house also passed Thursday morning the senate joint memorial to congress asking for tariff protection against foreign competition of timber and timber products.

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JURIST OUSTED FROM U. S. BAR

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 17. (AP)—Dismissal from membership in the American Bar association of Carlos S. Hardy, one of the two judges of the criminal court of Los Angeles county, Cal., brought to an unexpected conclusion the meeting of the association's executive committee here yesterday.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17. (AP)—Removal of the name of Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy from membership in the American Bar association follows upon a legal controversy in California over his acceptance of a \$2,500 check from Albee Temple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, for legal advice.

During a grand jury investigation of alleged official corruption in Los Angeles recently, Judge Hardy admitted accepting the check, but said that it was for services volunteered prior to the time that Mrs. McPherson was charged with conspiracy to defraud justice by telling a false story under oath in 1926 about her being kidnapped.

Besides his brother he has a sister, Letha McKenzie of Klamath Agency.

When young McKenzie was last seen he was wearing blue denim overalls and jumper, grey cap and tan oxfords.
