

WEALTHY HEIR MARRIES TODAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 18. (AP)—Thomas Fortune Ryan, 23, grand son of the late Thomas Fortune Ryan, financier, and the former Mrs. Margaret Moorhead Ryan were on a secret honeymoon today after a surprise marriage at the Municipal building.

They appeared at the marriage license bureau shortly before it closed yesterday accompanied by two friends, obtained a license and were married immediately by City Clerk Michael J. Cruise in his office.

Mrs. John Barry Ryan, mother of the bridegroom, said she knew nothing of the marriage or where her son was.

"If my son is married I don't know anything about it and I positively have nothing to say," Mrs. Ryan said. "He is not here and I don't know where he is."

Mr. Ryan, who gave his age as 25 and his occupation as rancher, is a member of an old and prominent Roman Catholic family. His father, John Barry Ryan, inherited approximately one-fifth of the estate left by Thomas Fortune Ryan, estimated from \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000.

The bridegroom's uncle, Allan A. Ryan, was cut off with the best of a pair of cuff links.

The bride is the daughter of the late John Moorhead, Jr., and member of a family that has figured in the steel industry.

Murders Are Confessed By Gang Member

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 18. (AP)—Clyde Roberts, better known as Whitey Walker, one of two men arrested by Buffalo police in connection with murders and robberies alleged to have been committed by the Ace Pendleton gang in the Southwest, broke down today and, according to Detective Chief Reville, confessed to three killings.

According to the police, Walker, who says his correct name is William J. Walker, admitted to the slaying in Berger, Texas, of Patrick Kenyon and Elmer Perry, deputy sheriffs, on April 1, 1927. With him at the time, was his brother, U. Walker, and Ed Bailey.

Walker is also said by police to have admitted the killing of Cole Buchanan, a policeman, at Stannett, Texas, March 1, 1927.

The prisoner denied all knowledge of Colorado slayings of which he has been accused.

Walker was in Fort Worth, Texas, in September, 1927, he told police, for robbing the Stockyard National bank, and again at Cote, Wyo., March 19, 1928, but escaped while being transferred to Billings, Mont.

Walker says he is a native of Milam county, Texas, and was born in 1901.

Fred Nave, held here with Walker, and also wanted in many cities and towns for crimes of various sorts, refused to make any admissions.

While the questioning of the pair was under way, a telegram came from Fred Bowels, sheriff of Pontotoc county, Oklahoma. It stated that Walker was wanted as the leader of the gang that held up a bank at Alesh, Okla.

"Walker has been positively identified," the telegram reads. "Conviction is certain. Carl Black, member of the gang, given life. Will pay entire reward offered by state is Walker is turned over to me."

Appropriation For State Pen To Be Passed

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Jan. 18. (AP)—Oregon's State penitentiary will receive an appropriation of \$53,000 to enlarge quarters for the over-crowded institution.

The Joint Ways and Means committee of the legislature today passed the appropriation, the first money measure to gain its attention.

The state prison now has 700 inmates in quarters designed for 500.

The appropriation will cover the construction of a new building 42 by 165 feet and remodeling of the old boys' training school. It also will cover alteration of the structure intended as a garage but never completed. The upper floor of the garage structure will be used to house 100 inmates.

The Volstead Act was passed over President Wilson's veto.
