Latest Sunday March 31—

Easter Sunday, which is always the first Sunday after Paschal full moon, falls on Sunday, March 31, this year. It is the first Sunday after the ecclesiastical full moon or next after March 21, and therefore cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25. People will be interested to know that Paschal full moon falls on a Sunday, then Easter Day is the following Sunday. The Paschal full moon is the fourteenth day of a lunar month reckoned according to an ancient ecclesiastical computation and not the real or astronomical full moon. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 13, which comes 40 days previous to Easter Sunday, not counting Sundays.
