BEEF OPERATOR
PASSES AWAY

Largest Individual Cattle
Owner in U. S. Dies
Yesterday

AMARILLO, Texas, Jan. 18. (AP)—Amarillo today mourned loss of its first citizen, Mayor Lee Bivins, 68, cattle and oil baron who owned or held under lease for cattle grazing more than 1,000,000 acres of Texas and Mexico land. He was reputed to be the largest individual cattle owner in the United States.

The cattle king was fatally stricken with heart disease at Wichita Falls yesterday, at about the time of the funeral of R. S. (Breck) Walker, Fort Worth and Breckenridge oil millionaire, who died the previous day.

Mr. Bivins was largely responsible for the growth of Amarillo from a cattle town to a booming oil metropolis. Two hundred thousand acres of his 100,000 acre LX ranch here were under lease to oil companies. Despite his oil enterprises and executive duties, however, he never changed from what he always told everyone he would be until his death, "Just a Texas cowman."

He was a typical cowboy in the strictest sense of the word although he lived to see the end of the Panhandle plains dotted with towns, ranches and oil derricks. Bivins came to the Panhandle when he was 27 years old and bought 12,000 acres of land at \$1.05 an acre. "As I sold my cattle, I bought more cattle," he said in explaining his acquisition of land and wealth.

He never considered his career particularly outstanding, and always said there wasn't much to tell about his life. He related that he was born in Texas, reared on a ranch, and that his first investment was a calf.

He was ever ready to grab make a friend, even during his lean days. When prosperity came in later life this generosity was expressed in many philanthropies.

His widow and two sons who were associated with their father, survive.

At The Pine Tree

Emil Jannings has proved again that he need not be beautiful. And he has shown also that realism, stark and powerful, is his forte on the screen. Realism with a grim, human quality that turns into the mild.

This time it is "The Street of Sin," more than a worthy successor to his first American production "The Way of All Flesh," which created a place for the tragic screen drama in a land given over to happy endings.

To appreciate the heart shock, the fine irony and the nation of this Paramount picture, go to see it at the Pine Tree Theatre where it is playing the last times today. Jannings stalks through the rubble of the London slums like a conqueror in condescend. The streets of Limehouse obey the threat of his fists and women love him despite his brutality.

It is essentially a story of regeneration but wrought different than ever before on the screen. His reformation, brought about by Fay Wray, who plays a Salvation Army lass, is vivid because it is truthful. His purpose in "playing good" is dire in the beginning. His friend, Olga Baklanova, has lost her street girl charm for him and he desires the purity of Fay Wray. He rises to an extreme that causes Miss Wray to go to the verge of death at the moment when he realizes his love for her and her love for him.

Miss Wray and Madame Baklanova, the latter a celebrated Russian actress from the Moscow Art Theatre, give splendid performances. Mauritz Stiller directed the picture from a story written by Josef von Sternberg and Benjamin Glaser, bearing the heart of squallid Limehouse.

At The Liberty

"The Young Whirlwind," a fast moving melodrama starring Buzz Barton, the famous Little EDD Western star, will be seen for the last time tonight at the Liberty Theatre.

The picture is undoubtedly the most interesting and thrilling that young Barton has had the opportunity of appearing in. It deals with the operations of a gang of bandits and their efforts to rob a United States air mail plane of a \$50,000 cash pay roll.

Buzz, in the role of a miner's pal, is intensely interested in the government plane and when he goes to make a forced landing he sees to the rescue on his pony, "Blaze". How he aids the stricken pilot, and after many new and thrilling escapades saves the money, is told in a most humanly interesting manner in a whirlwind climax.

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IMPEACHMENT
OF JUDGE, PLAN

Assemblyman from Los Angeles, it was referred to the judicial committee. The committee will submit a report, and if it suggests proceedings, the matter will be referred to the senate, sitting as a court, with the chief justice of the supreme court presiding.

Impeachment of the judge was sought by Arnold on the allegation that Hardy had accepted a \$2500 fee from Almerie Sample McPherson, evangelist, while occupying the bench. An attempt of the State Bar association to have a hearing on the subject has been the object of a legal controversy before the state supreme court.

Both houses of the legislature were beset with bills yesterday, among them some that gave promise of long debates at the second half of the session in February.

The "search and seizure" bill was introduced by William Hornblower, assemblyman from San Francisco. The bill is similar to one that caused a battle between the wets and dries at the last session. Hornblower claimed it would merely protect citizens against unauthorized entrance to their homes.

Simultaneously T. M. Wright, assemblyman from San Jose, announced he would introduce a bill to make the prohibition law of this state more stringent, which was considered a reprisal against Hornblower's measure.

Senator Victor Caneppa of San Francisco introduced a bill to permit householders 200 gallons of wine and beer annually.

The state was asked to get out of the land colony business under the terms of a bill proposed by J. M. Inman of Sacramento. It would appropriate \$185,000 to pay claims of settlers in the Delhi land colony.

Senator George W. Rochester of Los Angeles introduced a bill to place a state tax similar to the gas tax on every bag of cement sold in the state. Proceeds would go to the highway fund for new construction.

Removal of state jurisdiction over judges, district attorneys and city attorneys was proposed in a bill offered by H. C. Jones, senator from San Jose.

A bill that would give the industrial accident commission the same power as the courts against those appearing before it, was proposed by Senator Jones. This commission, should the bill pass, could punish for contempt of court or disbar lawyers practicing before it.

Abolishment of the judicial

council was proposed in a bill introduced by Senator Ralph Swing of San Bernardino.

A San Francisco-Alameda delegation introduced a bill asking that the state be allowed to build a toll bridge across San Francisco bay, bonds to be authorized by the legislature and ratified by the people at election.

Assemblyman Frank Luttrell of Santa Rosa introduced a bill which calls for the appointment of a commission to investigate home rule for counties.

Placing of aircraft companies under the jurisdiction of the railroad commission was provided in a bill introduced by R. J. Polgenbaum of San Francisco in the assembly. A joint committee of the senate and assembly to investigate aviation conditions in California regarding the questions of safety and prevention of accidents was asked to a bill submitted by Assemblymen Williamson and Cronin of San Francisco.

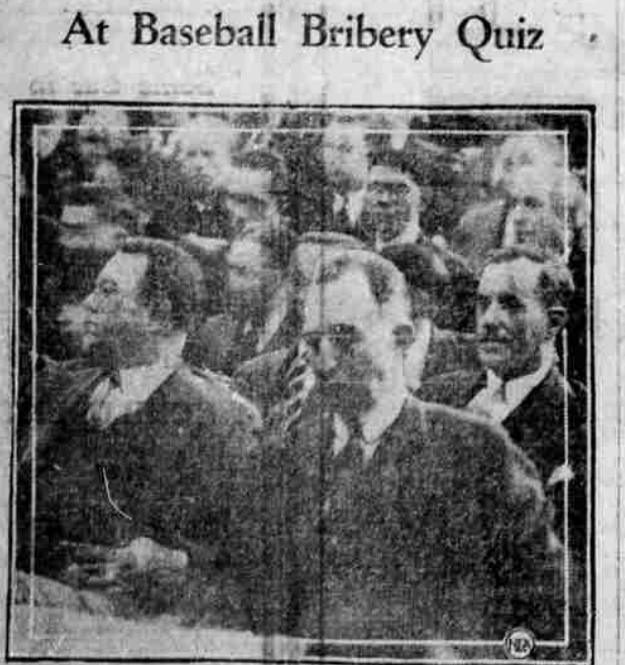
