DECIMAL CAUSE OF LARGE ROW AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18. (UP) — Lack of attention to a decimal point upset the house ways and means committee for half an hour today, and temporarily demoralized hearings on the log schedule.

E. F. Blaine of Seattle, Wash., asked the removal of the present duty of \$1 per thousand, alleging that tariff commission investigation in 1923 had revealed that northwestern loggers were making "sixteen and eighteen hundred per cent on their investments."

His statement caused violent cross-examination from the republican side.

After a long examination Representative Garner, democrat of Texas, discovered Blaine had intended to say "sixteen and eighteen one-hundredths per cent." With this clarification the hearing proceeded.
