

GIRL FAILS TO NAME COPS IN VICE TRAFFIC

Unable to Pick Out Parties Guilty From Group of Blue-Coats

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 18. (U. P.)—An incipient vice investigation and police department scandal threatened to die an early death here when Crystal Wagenblast, 21, faltered in her attempts today to identify four policemen out of a lineup of 18 bluecoats.

The Wagenblast girl was the one whose story last Monday startled the district attorney's office into sudden action to discover whether there was organized vice conditions in Portland's downtown area.

The girl confessed when arrested to being an inmate of a hotel operated as a vice resort. At that time she said she had seen four uniformed policemen collect money from her landlady. She also named nine small downtown hotels as places organized for vice purposes. Later she added two more names of such hotels.

The woman also named two 14 and 15 year old girls as prostitutes.

The police lineup before the girl at today's grand jury session was one result of her story. The city council's summoning of the hotel operators to show cause why their licenses shouldn't be revoked was another. The placing of the two younger girls in an institution was a third.

Whether the investigation would continue much longer was a question today. The girl closely scanned the line of uniformed patrolmen that included three sergeants, but failed to identify a single one positively. She did, however, turn in the numbers of six of the patrolmen as resembling the "types" she said she had seen take bribes.

Memorial For Late J. B. Yeon Is Suggested

SALEM, Jan. 18. (AP)—Appropriation of \$2500 from the funds of the state highway commission for the location and erection of a suitable memorial to the memory of the late John B. Yeon, former chairman of the highway commission, and one of the pioneers in the good roads movement in Oregon, will be proposed in a concurrent resolution to be introduced in the senate next Monday by Senator Joe Dunne.

The resolution will also ask the appointment of a commission consisting of B. VanDuser of the present highway commission; John W. Kelly, political editor of the Oregonian, and Robert C. Johnson, automobile editor of the Oregon Journal, "to select and acquire some suitable site or location in the state of Oregon, and procure and cause to be constructed thereon a suitable monument of such character, type, design and size, and bearing thereon such inscription as in the judgment and discretion of said memorial committee will most appropriately and fittingly commemorate the memory and service of the late Honorable John B. Yeon to the state, of Oregon."

The resolution attributes to Mr. Yeon "a large measure of credit for the forward-looking program which has resulted in placing the state of Oregon in an advanced position among the states of the Union in highway construction, for Mr. Yeon pioneered in this work, and gave generously of his energy, his experience, his thought and his wealth."
