Colonel C. G. Thomson

WITH REGRET and yet with a realization of merit rewarded, do we view the promotion of Colonel C. G. Thomson from the post of superintendent of Crater National park to superintendent of Yosemite National park.

For years Colonel Thomson has devoted his life to the development of Crater Park. He has not confined his energies to the single job of administration—a large task in itself—but has labored long and steady towards publicizing the great summer playground and to securing sufficient appropriations to finance many necessary improvements. Under his direction, Crater National park has developed from a minor attraction to one of the major vacation spots of the United States.

In his new position Colonel Thomson will have added responsibilities. Yosemite park comprises an area of 1125 miles as compared with 249 miles in Crater park and, because of its accessibility to large population centers, attracts many thousands more tourists each summer.

We extend congratulations to Colonel Thomson for his success in national park service work and wish him the same success in his work that rewarded his efforts while superintendent of Crater National park.

Rather Ill-Timed

Singers Will Honor Memory Of Noted Poet

The skill of imaginary bagpipes and the scent of Highland heather will fill the ether next Thursday evening, January 24, when the Seiberling Singers will do again a group of Scotch melodies that have been demanded by listeners-in since they first played and sang them almost a year ago. And they will repeat them, appropriately enough, almost on the anniversary of the birth of Scotland's immortal bard, Robbie Burns, who was born on January 25, 1796 years ago.

In a special arrangement by Frank Black, musical director of the Seiberling hour, and one of the foremost of modern composers and arrangers, the Seiberling Singers quartet will do a medley of Scotch folk songs—"Robbie Burns," "Ye Banks and Braes of Bonnie Doon" and "Comin' Thro' the Rye." Company Compelled to Further Increase Record Breaking Schedule

So great has been the demand for the new Greater Hudson and the Essex Challenger that the company has been compelled to further increase its already record breaking production schedule. The amended schedule, which has been announced by Courtney Johnson, general sales manager, calls for 27,000 cars in January, 27,000 in February and 45,000 in March, or a total of 102,000 cars during the first quarter. This schedule is the largest ever planned for Hudson, Essex, being far in excess of the largest quarter during 1928, which year saw the company advanced to third place at the National Automobile show and to top position among manufacturers of six cylinder cars. "The demand," says Mr. Johnson, "exceeds even the most optimistic hopes of the company and comes from every section of the country."

Monday the lawmakers will get to work in earnest with scores of important issues facing them.

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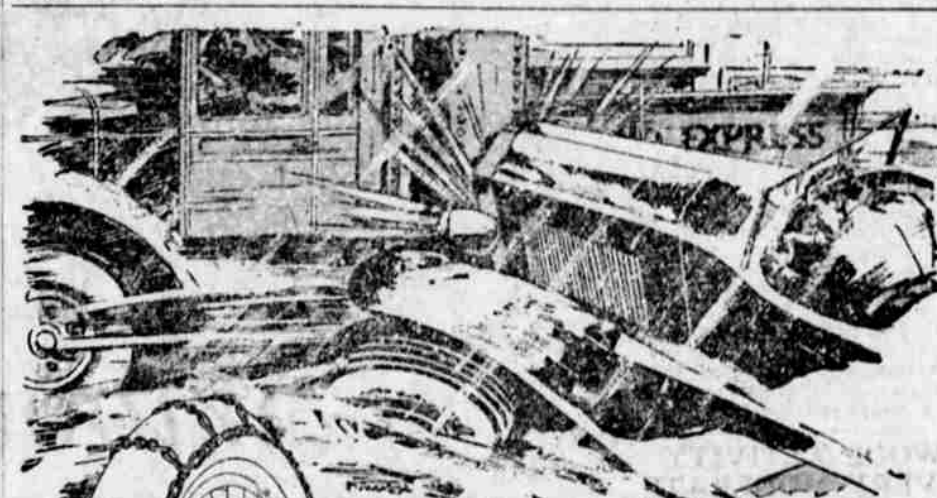
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
