Mr. Budd Speaks

RALPH BUDD, president of the Great Northern Railroad, is quoted in San Francisco papers, as denying any plan of extending his railroad south from Klamath Falls to connect with the Western Pacific at or near Paxton, Calif. In fact, the famous rail executive went so far as to say that he doubted if the matter had ever been considered by his board of directors.

It would be presumptuous, on the part of this newspaper, to do otherwise than accept the denial at its face value; we have too high a regard for Mr. Budd's veracity.

Yet, denial or no denial, there are certain facts surrounding the South Central Oregon and Northern California railroad situation which makes one believe that the day is coming—and not far distant—when the Great Northern will have access to the California freight plum—but that does not mean construction, necessarily.

Review the money expended in building into Klamath, and then consider the available return in tonnage from this territory. Was a \$110,000 passenger station—far bigger and better than the Southern Pacific station—constructed just for passenger service between Bend and Klamath Falls? Was a railroad yard site five times larger than present use requires, bought just for a pastime? Is James J. Hill's great objective—that of building south from Bend into California where his great enemy, Harriman, held sway—to be sluffed off when the Great Northern is knocking at the entrance door of the Golden State?

If such is the case, we must admit profound surprise coupled with a conviction that the original plans of the Great Northern railroad have been changed since the extension to Klamath Falls was completed. The money invested, the high type of officials installed here, the possible alignment with Arthur Curtiss James, and—more than anything else—the big revenue from increased tonnage, led us to believe that a southward extension was inevitable.

Mr. Budd answered the newspapermen's questions but these questions did not probe deeply enough. In other words, it may be true that the Great Northern will not build into California, but is there any reason why the Western Pacific—propelled by the great Arthur Curtiss who is also the largest single stockholder in the Great Northern—should not extend northward to Klamath Falls to meet the Great Northern?

What difference does it make? The same purpose will be served. The Northern line will turn over its traffic bound for the south to the Western Pacific in Klamath Falls; and the Western Pacific will give its northbound tonnage to the Great Northern for distribution.

Mr. Budd is a smart man. He disarmed newspaper reporters by frank answers and, we believe, blew out a thick enough smoke screen to cover the real object which is being considered at this time.

the junction of Alameda and Traversa Streets in said city, the said point being near engineers station numbered 105550. For the purpose of such diversion, the Secretary of the Interior is authorized and directed to acquire the necessary right of way and to construct between the points as described a suitable tunnel for the conveyance of the waters now flowing between such points in an open cut which constitutes a hazard to the life and health of the people of said city. There is hereby authorized to be appropriated the sum of \$200,000 to be expended by the Secretary of the Interior for the purposes of this Act and to remain available until expended.

HARMONIZING LICENSE LAWS WILL BE TRIED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 22. (AP)—First steps toward harmonizing existing and proposed motor vehicle license laws in Oregon with similar statutes in the state of Washington were taken Monday night when the house committee on roads and highway drafted a resolution which will be presented to the house, and in which the senate is expected to concur, appointing two members of the house and two from the senate to meet with a similar committee from the Washington state legislature. Klamath County Sportsmen Association by resolution entered at regular meeting held last night went on record as opposed to reducing bag limit on deer for Klamath County. Statistics show deer increasing in Klamath county each year. If reduction is necessary in other counties law should be so framed as to fix limit of one deer for those counties needing and asking for it. This is the method adopted in other states. We trust you will use your influence to see that law is framed as above but that in event the limit is not reduced to one deer for Klamath county.

For like reasons the season should not be shortened. Furthermore the greatest danger in shortening the season is that it will have a tendency to throw a great number of sportsmen in the woods at one time thereby greatly increasing the loss of life from accidents.
