SECRETARY OF PRISON WARDEN UNDER ARREST

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 22. (U.P.)—John W. Williamson, 29, secretary last year to the warden of McNeil Island penitentiary, was held in \$1500 bond today on a charge of bilking families of federal prisoners.

The specific charge against Williamson is that he wrote a letter to a prisoner's wife, forging the prisoner's name and asking that \$20 be sent immediately.

Postal inspectors allege Williamson intercepted such letters in the warden's office and stole the money.

SCHOOL MARM' CLEVER FORGER

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 22. (U.P.)—A mysteriously 42-year-old school teacher confessed today to what police termed one of the most ingenious check forging stunts ever perpetrated here. She obtained more than \$1000 by her operations, they said.

The school teacher was Mrs. Susie Worth. Her victims were merchants in Spokane, Seattle and Yakima. Handwriting experts discovered her identity by checking the script on one of the checks with the handwriting she used to register at a hotel here under one of her many aliases.

"AFFINITY" EARLE OF CALM SOUL KISS FAME IN SCANDAL LAWSUIT

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22. (U.P.)—Ferdinand Phineas Earle, for more than a decade widely known as "Affinity" Earle, was named defendant today in a \$180,000 breach of promise suit filed in superior court by Miss Dolores L. Salazar, 21.

She charged in her complaint that Earle seduced her under promise of marriage, induced her to live with him as his wife and took her to Paris where he left her stranded.

Miss Salazar declared that after she became engaged to marry Earle in February, 1927, he married Denis Louise in Paris in January, 1928. At the time she met Earle an introductory decree had been granted his most recent wife and he induced her

to go to Mexico where a marriage ceremony which he represented would be valid was held, she said.

It was more than 16 years ago that "affinity" and the "calm soul kiss" were used in connection with Earle's love affairs in the east. His first wife charged him with cruelty and association with another woman and Earle replied that Julian Kuttner was his "soul affinity."

Earle married Miss Kuttner when his wife received a divorce. Later he became divorced from Miss Kuttner and there followed Helen Stifford Earle and Charlotte Christoff Earle. Four women were said to have figured in his life when the latter obtained a divorce here.

Clark Theory of Evolution Evokes Praise From Pastor And Scorn From Scientists

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. — The theory of Dr. Austin H. Clark that man came upon the earth in much his present form and did not evolve from some far lower animal, was warmly endorsed today by Rev. John R. Straton, recognized leader of the fundamentalists in religion.

Dr. Clark explained his theory in an interview with the United Press on Sunday. He was unable to accept theories that man evolved from a fish or an ape through many processes of development. He believes that man came upon the earth as a distinct species.

"I am glad to hear a responsible scientist tell the truth for once," Dr. Straton, whose millennial fundamentalism has brought him into conflict with scientists so often, told the United Press.

"There is not one scintilla of truth or real evidence in support of the theory that man descended from beast."

"The whole evolution propaganda is the most gigantic bluff in the history of the human mind. The older school of scientists, including Dalton and Dana, ridiculed the evolution theory but the belligerent, dogmatic, materialistic school is trying to bluff its way through."

"I hope that Prof. Clark's new theory will start the scientific world on another tangent. I am glad to hear such a responsible man speak the truth and the time for it is most opportune."

Scientists who commented were not as ready to accept Clark's theory, however, as was Dr. Straton.

"It sounds incredible that he should have made such a statement," said Ray Chapman Andrews, who has devoted years to expeditions into the Gobi desert searching for signs of the beginnings of mankind.

Dr. William K. Gregory, professor of paleontology at Columbia university, found Prof. Clark's theory "distressingly vague." It contained, he said, no explanation of how the various groups, including man, beast, fish and the like, "were suddenly derived from other groups."

Prof. Oakes Ames of Harvard thought "that on the face of it, it appears to be rubbish," but said he would withhold additional comment until he could study thoroughly Prof. Clark's theory.

Dr. Arthur H. Wiggan of the Boston University graduate school termed it "absurd."

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 22. (U.P.)—Col. James Elverson, 50, publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer, died of heart disease today.
