## PRESIDENT OF U. OF W. ASKS LEGAL ADVICE

Enjoy Best Prospects in Over Ten Years for Next Season

SEATTLE, Jan. 24. (AP)—The Bagshaw Imbrolio was as unsettled today as ever with the prospect that it would be at least two days more before President M. Lyle Spencer of the University of Washington completes his attempt to untie the Gordian knot.

A series of conferences failing to determine whether he should uphold the student board of control in its ouster of Enoch Bagshaw as head football coach, or the Faculty Athletic committee in its refusal to approve the board's action, Dr. Spencer again called for legal advice yesterday. Just what advice he asked, like the substance of the discussions was kept secret.

With the president during yesterday's sessions was David Thompson, dean of faculties who, the president announced would sit with him at all further meetings. Dr. Thompson has formally recommended that the university is "morally bound" to retain Bagshaw in the position he has held for eight years until his contract expires in three years.

Chief among those who were called into the president's office were seven alumni who oppose the coach. Eleven members of the student board also conferred with Dr. Spencer. Meanwhile Ward Kumm, an alumnus who has announced that he is acting as Bagshaw's personal attorney watched faithfully from the outer side of Dr. Spencer's office door.

Warren Caldwell, the lengthy center of the Quakers, tipped the ball to Millard, who saw the Central guards up the floor for a shot. Its dribbled ball bounced and then shot the ball weaving through the net as the fans screamed the floor to break up the scene and not permit the few remaining seconds to be played. Old timers say the finish has never been equaled in any game played in the Hawkeye state since.

## Jack Sharkey Confident of Fight Victory

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (AP)—There was an abundance of confidence today at the training quarters of Jack Sharkey of Boston and K. O. Christner, graduate of the Akron Rubber plants, who meet in a ten-round clash in Madison Square Garden tomorrow night.

The loquacious gob can see nothing in the scrap but a good warm-up for his battle with young Stribling at Miami Beach while the 34-year-old Okla-on, who sprang into prominence by punching Knute Hansen out of the heavyweight picture a couple of months ago, has told the world he expects to tag Sharkey with the same wallop he used on the melancholy dane.

Realizing that he must make a better than ordinary showing tomorrow if the Stribling fight is to meet with any financial success, Sharkey says he will end the affair in short order.

"One punch hitters are always dangerous, even to the cleverest ring man," he declared. "But I have met them before, held my own and carried the fight my way. I am not blind to the fact that Christner can hit. But I feel I am good enough to beat him and go on past Stribling and the rest to the title."
