IMPEACHMENT OF EXECUTIVE VOTED TODAY

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 25. (UP)—An eighth impeachment bill was voted against Governor Henry S. Johnston by the Oklahoma house late yesterday.

The bill charges the governor with illegally pardoning and restoring citizenship to Dewey Crosthwaite, fugitive murderer of an Oklahoma city school teacher.

The vote was 69 to 24, and followed two hours of debate climaxed by a near fist fight. Chas. Moon, anti-Johnston member, and Bob Wagner, Johnston supporter, almost came to blows on the House floor when Wagner called Moon "a damn liar," in the course of debate.

SUED FOR \$30,250.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 25. (AP)—Roy S. Grady sued S. Barr and his son, Mario Barr, for \$30,250 damages, alleging the Barr boy had poured lye over the face of Grady's son, Bruce, aged 7. The complaint charged Barr with negligence in leaving lye where his son could get it.

RURAL CITIES SPEND IN K. F.

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of year, checks drawn on these small rural banks and cashed in Klamath Falls total over \$1000 a day from Dorris, \$500 a day from Bonanza, \$2000 a day from Merrill, and over \$1000 a day from Lakeview. Other communities in the same area would expend money in the same ratio as these four.

Ten days of January were selected to secure an idea of expenditures in this city from territory contiguous to Klamath Falls. In these ten days it was found that checks on the Merrill bank totaled \$27,889.46; on the Bonanza bank, \$4,570.62; on the three of the Lakeview banks—there are four—\$10,947.97; and on the Dorris bank, \$10,871.93.

These amounts vary with the season, and the fact that this is the quietest time of the entire year, leads to the deduction that during the spring, summer and early fall, they are much larger.

Good roads, additional railroad facilities and growth of Klamath Falls, has established this city as the trading center of south central Oregon, south of Bend, and of northern California, east of the Cascades.

Dean Upholds Moral Conduct Of University

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Jan. 25. (Special)

"College students as a group have a moral conduct distinctly superior to that of a group of the same size outside of college," said Hugh Biggs, assistant dean of men, when asked about the moral standards of university students, especially with reference to drinking.

University students are less conservative now than they were formerly. This should not be regarded as a lowering of morals, however, but as a disregard for what they consider useless and old-fashioned conventions.

Newspapers, as a rule, never lose occasion to censure the university for drinking among the students, and although the rule against drinking among the students is occasionally broken, they are not as numerous as elsewhere. Wide publicity is given the slightest infraction of this drinking rule which would be totally ignored in any other place.

Dean Biggs stated that the moral situation at the University of Oregon is better than of any other community of the same size including the same number of young people that he has ever observed.

SUNDAY SCHOOL TO BE OPENED FOR ALTAMONT

Altamont residents are to have a community Sunday school. The several hundred children besides adults in that district have been without local Bible instruction, and when the weather has been bad many have been unable to attend the Sunday schools in town. The new school opens Sunday at two o'clock for the registration of pupils; after that it will meet at two-thirty o'clock. It will meet in the Altamont school.

The work will be affiliated with the Presbyterian church. A goodly staff of teachers has been secured, so that there will be classes for every department from the beginners, through the primary, intermediate and seniors to adults. Hearty encouragement has been given the opening of the school by the residents of the district several of whom will have a part in the work.

TWO KILLED IN MEXICO SCRAP

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 25. (AP)—Two new assassinations in connection with the election in the state of Hidalgo were reported to the government today by partisans of Dr. Jose Parres, one of the candidates for governor. The new victims were named as Capt. Eduardo Perez Montezuma and Alfonso Gonzalez. They were both candidates on the Parres ticket for the state legislature.

In their complaint to the government today Paristas charged that their opponents had established a veritable reign of terror in Hidalgo. They asserted that 13 armed men had entered the town of San Juan Tepa and had assassinated Felipe Delgado.

The band was said then to have proceeded toward the town of Francisco I Madero with the intention of assaulting adherents of the Parres party in that place. The townspeople became so alarmed that they abandoned their homes and sought refuge in nearby caves, in which they had been living ever since.

Complaint was also made that Antonio Hernandez, a leader of the Parres forces had been assassinated at the town of Atotonilco.
