

HONOR SYSTEM AT UNIVERSITY CLAIMED FARGE

Article States University
of California Students
Violate Trust

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 25. (UP)—The honor system existing at the University of California was debated last night following an article by George Taya, fellow of the history department, in the student publication today which claimed "the system is a farce."

"In the final exams last December, in the political science class of former President David Prescott Barrows, practically all the students in the class were sitting on the steps of Wheeler Hall, reading the questions and checking the answers in their books," Taya wrote in the Daily Californian.

"Cheating in the finals was flagrant and without precedent in the university," Taya said he personally called attention to some students to the honor system "and was greeted by laughter and remarks not fit to print."

Dr. Barrows said he was greatly surprised at the accusation against members of his class and the students involved denied the assertions.

Approximately 400 students are tried for dishonesty each year by the student courts, Kenneth H. Masters, chairman of the men's court, said. He offered the personal belief that many students were never tried because of the aversion of classmates "to tell on them."

CO-ED ROBBER GRANTED RIGHT TO 2ND TRIAL

FROZEN RIVER HELPS RUNNERS

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 25. (AP)—Opportunities afforded liquor smugglers by the frozen Detroit river were described by the Toronto Globe today as follows:

Six inches of river ice interrupted by less than 100 feet of open water, coupled with the fact that Sumner C. Sleeper, chief of the Detroit Customs patrol, and a dozen of his men had thrown up their jobs, presented to the rum trafficking fraternity an opportunity which they have been denied for many months.

Taking advantage of the situation the smugglers speeded up production and by using small automobiles, sleighs and even old fashioned toboggans succeeded in transporting an undetermined quantity of liquor and Canadian beer to Detroit and its environs. The operations were carried on boldly and in the sight of hundreds of spectators who lined the shores to watch the progress of the scores of caravans over the frozen waste.

In several instances small cars were observed hitched to boats with steel runners which whisked them across in express time. When the open stretch of water was encountered the boats were utilized. Further down the river the ice was solid all the way across and the boats were dispatched with. On the Detroit side large vans labelled furniture and express were observed speeding away from the river within a few minutes after a cargo had landed. There was no attempt at interference at any time so far as reported.
