Nicholas' Victory

THE Grand Duke Nicholas of Russia, gone to his grave with the last hopes of the czarists who never could see that history had turned over a new leaf on them, was a striking example of the way a man can fail and still be a success.

Although Nicholas commanded the armies of one of the allied powers, we can safely say now, that he was on the wrong side. He served an autocracy that was corrupt to the core, reeking with centuries of oppression and misrule. The world war tore it down, and it deserved its fate. Czardom had given the world all that it had to give, and it was time for it to give way to something better.

But to Nicholas, imperial Russia was the greatest thing in the world. He fought for it with bitter tenacity. With inflexible resolution, he sacrificed scores of thousands of uncomplaining soldiers in a vain effort to keep the past upon its throne. He served a bad cause, and he was beaten. Yet—and here is the point—we admired him. When the papers announced that he was dead we felt that the world had lost a genuine man and was the poorer for it.

Consider the circumstances that preceded the final collapse of the Russian armies. Russia was confusion and inefficiency personified. In the court there were doubt, intrigue, disloyalty and corruption. Soldiers were sent out unequipped—driven to the front, often, without ammunition or food. The czar wavered between crafty, self-seeking counselors. Czardom, in its death struggle, was proving that it did not deserve to live longer.

But amid all this confusion Nicholas stood loyal and brave, like a rock. He dared defy even the czar himself in his fight for the right as he saw it. To the end he was unshaken and unperplexed. The men at Petrograd let him down again and again; he fought on, using the faulty tools that they gave him without complaint.

In short, he was a genuine Man, looming large in an edifying welter of half-men. He had courage, fidelity and endurance, and those qualities are not yet too common.

It isn't necessary that a man accomplish everything he sets out to accomplish in order to make a successful life. The manner in which he goes about it is what counts. The true field for accomplishment lies within. If a man wins in that field it doesn't matter greatly whether he wins elsewhere or not.

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AMERICA'S LONGEST TUNNEL FINISHED



The west and east are closer by rail as a result of completion of the Cascade tunnel through the mountains between Scenic and Bernes, Washington. The tunnel, eight miles long, cuts off many heavy grades. Built by the Great Northern Railway at a cost of over \$16,000,000, the bore is the longest in America and fifth longest in the world.
