ORVILLE DARR CONFIDENT OF WINNING FIGHT

Think He'll Kayo Nails; Odds 10 to 8 in Favor of Gorman

Confidence has anything to do with winning fights, Orville Darr, sensational Spokane light heavyweight, has Nails Gorman, hard-hitting and clever Hood River scrapper, beaten today.

Darr, who meets Gorman in the main event of the Legion fight on Friday night, fairly exudes confidence; not only does he say he will beat Gorman, but he asserts he will lay him away with a sweet kayo punch before the seventh round.

However, despite Darr's confidence, the betting boys have installed Gorman a 10 to 8 favorite in the betting. There's lots of talk both ways, and Friday evening will see much cash change hands.

Tox Bickerstaff, matchmaker for the Legionnaires' fight card, has just returned from Bend, dribbling over with enthusiasm for Jimmy Murray who meets Mike Daly of Pelican City in the semi-windup.

Murray fought a main event with the slugging Norton of Eugene, and while defeated over the ten round bout, staged one of the most sensational comebacks ever witnessed in a Bend ring. Text asserts:

The Bend writer was badly beaten for the first part of the fight; in fact, he was dropped a couple of times. But just when the cash customers were packing up their things and getting ready to go home, he unleashed a battering come-back in the tenth round that nearly knocked Norton cold before the final bell sounded.

He gave the fight to Norton on previous points, but Murray showed himself to be a same fighter.

Incidentally both of the Breedlove boys—Jack meets Chuck Martin in a six round special event and Willie fights Bud Jerry in a four round preliminary—won their fights on the same card.

The fight card is well balanced from beginning to end and gives promise of a real fist throwing exhibition.

Darr and Gorman are training hard in the Legion Memorial hall plus on the court house block. This card is being staged under the auspices of the American Legion post. The first fight of the evening, Roy Rose against Joe Effman, will start at 8:45 o'clock sharp.

SAN FRANCISCO MEN ENTERED IN LONGEST RACE

Pearson arrived at Fort Klamath today to put the finishing touches on his training, and will run over the course Thursday to qualify for his board and lodging. There is no doubt in the minds of those who have seen him go but that he will easily qualify.

SUGAR IS BOON IN DAILY DIET

The Truth About Sugar and Tooth Structure

There has been so much talk in this country about teeth that we recently asked an outstanding dental authority to discuss dental care from the standpoint of sweets.

"Sugar in the diet," he says, "has no effect on the tooth structure of either child or adult. Wherever people have poor teeth, it is not a case of sugar but due to some other cause which sufficient study would reveal."

It may be heredity or faulty diet during childhood or later. Children, in order to develop good teeth and bones, must have the vitamins and minerals of milk, cereals, fruits and vegetables. Adults must continue to include these in their diet if the teeth and bones are to remain healthy.

"Steele" May Be Saved From Fishers' Nets

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 12. (AP)—Agitation of sportsmen throughout the state against the gradual extermination of steelhead trout through the activities of commercial fishermen, has resulted in the introduction of three house bills by Peters of Washington county which make steelheads a game fish.

House bills 78 and 479, companion bills, introduced Tuesday afternoon make the steelhead, regardless of size, a game fish in all waters of the state including the Columbia. The bill prohibits the commercial taking of steelhead in any of these waters and gives the game commission authority to designate the portions of streams of the state above tide-water where steelhead 15 inches or more in length may be taken by anglers.

Peter's third bill, house bill 489, excludes steelhead and trout from the classification of salmon and prohibits the taking of small salmon and trout in any of the waters of the state of Oregon or in waters over which the state has concurrent jurisdiction by means other than by hook and line, excepting Dolly Varden trout.

JAPANESE OUT OF CUE MATCH

NEW YORK, Feb. 12. (UP)—Klary Matsuyama, Day Japanese who for a time threatened to win the world's 18.2 ball cue billiard championship, was eliminated from the running today when he was defeated by Jake Schaefer of Chicago, 499 to 331, in 17 1/2 innings.

It was the second straight defeat offered by Matsuyama. Walker Cochran of California having administered the first defeat last night.

Schaefer's victory placed him in a tie for first place with Cochran and upon their meeting Wednesday night, depends the outcome of the championship tournament. Schaefer and Cochran each have won three games and lost one.

Edouard Horemans of Belgium, who had the title wrested from him in the tournament, met Eric Hazenbacher of Germany in tonight's match, which had no effect on the championship.
