Nails Stung by Confidence of Opponent in Friday Main Event

Stung by the confidence of his opponent, Orville Darr, casual al Spokane light heavyweight, Nails Gorman, Hood River scrapper, today proposed to the opposing camp that the Friday night main event in the Legion Memorial hall be staged on a winner-take-all basis.

No reply to this proposition has yet been heard from Darr's adherents.

From a normal fight, the main event has suddenly taken on lots of color, due to the personalities being flung back and forth. Not that it is a grudge fight for the two adversaries don't even know each other. But the public attention from first one camp and then the other have loaded each fighter into a fury awakened by professional pride.

Darr, attired in rough clothes, told the Herald sporting editor, that he was going in to win "and by the shortest route possible." "This boy Gorman is tough, alright, and I'm not underestimating him in the least. However, I am in the pink and honestly think I can take him to a cleaning. Whatever the outcome the fans will certainly know they have seen a fight before the end comes."

Those who have watched the two boys work out, believe that Darr will take the offensive from the start. Gorman is essentially a counter puncher while Darr is a windmill scrapper, flots flying "any-which-way" and seldom taking a backward step.

Mike Daley, after hearing of Jimmy Murray's showing in Bend, is working harder than ever for his semi-windup bout with the Bend brawler. The tough Pelican City fighter is in great trim for what may turn out to be the hardest fight of his career.

JAKE SHAEFER 18.2 BALKLINE CUE CHAMPION

Wins Title for Fifth Time in Past Seven Years at Tourney

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Jacob Schaefer of Chicago, still "Young Jake" despite 34 years of age and a dozen years of major competition, is the world's 18.2 balkline champion for the fifth time in a period of just over seven years. By triumphing over Welker Cochran, Hollywood cue star, by the narrow margin of 100 to 325 in the final match of the international tournament, Schaefer won his third championship tournament and his fifth title. Twice he defeated other titleholders in challenge matches under the now-abandoned system.

"The brilliant son of the 'wizard' of billiards, old Jake Schaefer, won his first tournament in 1921 and played through to victory again in 1923.

Schaefer, who made his first public appearance as a billiardist in exhibitions with his father when he was only six years old, was at his brilliant best last night. Cochran was not far behind, losing his chance at a second championship through two costly fouls. Twice when he was in the middle of good runs with chances of overtaking his opponent, he lost out by touching the ball one time with his cue and a second with the tip of his cue before it had stopped moving.

One brilliant cluster of 149 in the sixth inning played the major part in Schaefer's victory. This gave him a lead of 204 to 153, just enough to stand off the Californian's closing rush. Cochran flicked off his high runs of 82 and 81 in the eighth and ninth frames, overcoming Schaefer's close defensive tactics with daring shots. He was held to two billiards in the last two frames while Schaefer gathered the balls for a run of 55 in the eleventh to finish the match.
