Washington Huskies Go on Scoring Bee Against Staters Last Night

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 16, (A. P.)—Stanford University's basketball team clinched second place honors in the southern section of the Pacific Coast conference last night, and retained a slight numerical chance to tie for the section championship with California, defeating Southern California 21 to 21.

If California loses to the University of Southern California at Los Angeles tonight, if Stanford beats the Trojans tonight, and if Stanford defeats California next Saturday, the Cards and Bears will be tied for the title. The Southern division standings at the present:

LOMSKI GIVEN NOO AS CROWD HOOTS, BOOES

14,000 Spectators Think "Tuffy" Griffith Cheat—Out of Decision

DETROIT, Feb. 16, (A. P.)—Jerry "Tuffy" Griffith, the wallop from Sioux City, Iowa, today holds a popular if not an official decision over Leo Lomski, acknowledged as the leading challenger for the world's light heavyweight championship, as a result of their close 10 round battle in the Olympic arena last night.

The verdict of Elmer "Slim" McClelland, the referee, went to Lomski, but the cheers of 14,000 spectators went to Griffith. The decision, proclaiming Lomski the winner, was loudly and persistently booed. Besides the tumult of jeers, there was a shower of papers and programs from the gallery. A majority of the spectators thought Griffith was entitled to the decision, and they gave him a roar of acclamation. The spectators booed McClelland from the ring in expressing their approval.

Unbiased ring observers agreed today that the battle was so close that it could have been awarded to either man. McClelland figured that Lomski, the "Assassin" from Aberdeen, Wash., won the last three rounds by a conclusive margin, and therefore was entitled to the verdict.

At times Griffith out-boxed the contender from the Pacific coast. He displayed surprising speed with the left hand, that he repeatedly jabbed to Lomski's face. Several times he forced Lomski to retreat from the force of rights to the head, and he continually jumped forward with left hooks to the body. He made his greater strength and long reach count in his bid for victory.

Lomski Speeds Up. Lomski began to cut down Griffith's lead in the seventh round, although his margin was slender. He began to move out in front in the eighth, his best round, when he out-boxed and out-stepped his Iowa rival. Continuing his aggressive attack in the ninth and tenth, Lomski's left hand shot out fast, and he brought blood from Tuffy's nose.

The Washington man continually slipped inside of Griffith's right crosses, causing him to miss frequently. Neutral observers figure that each boxer won four rounds, and that two, perhaps, were even, and that Lomski deserved to win on points as long as McClelland is determined there is no such thing as a draw.

Both Lomski and Griffith weighed in under the light heavyweight limit of 175 pounds.

Klamath Plays Wonderful Game To Tounce Bend High; Kendle Outstanding Star, Scoring 21

Playing by far the best game of basketball ever shown by a Klamath high school team, the Klamath High quintet completely outclassed the Bend High team last night, on the local court, the final count giving Klamath 24 to Bend 11. Coach French's aggregation seemed at last to have gained those all-essentials of the great indoor game, a fast-breaking offensive with an uncanny ability to hit the basket, which no Klamath High team has ever displayed before in any extent.

The game was far more interesting than the score might indicate, for not once did the hard checking, fast breaking and accurate shooting Klamath five slow up in their quest for points. Apparently determined to test their new-found strength to the finish, they never gave the Bend team a chance to get started.

It is doubtful if Kendle's and Cochet's basket-shooting has ever been equaled in Klamath country. Kendle made 21 points, while his team mate, Cochet, was ringing in 15. It was not the fact that Kendle was high point man that placed him so far ahead of the others, but his ability to get the short time after time when Bend players were all over him and around him. He would side step, turn, pivot and then sink another "impossible" shot. Cochet wasn't far behind Kendle, either, and time after time had his guard trailing him in to the basket, only to witness another two more points for Klamath's score.

The Klamath quintet worked just as well on the defensive as they did on the offensive, seldom letting a Bend player through for a shot. The checking of Pruitt, Robertson and Olson was so effective that during the first half Brown, the Bend scoring ace, did not get a single shot at the basket, and his team mate, McKay, only was allowed one try, but he didn't connect. The Klamath defense continually rushed the Bend players in every corner of the court, never allowing them to get set for any offensive strategy they might have planned.

Time after time the Bend players lost the ball before they had a chance to make a single pass toward their basket. It was probably anything else that accounted for this defensive play as much for the complete rout of the Bend team. To make it more honorable, however, the Klamath offensive was breaking for too fast for the Bend guards to follow. Cochet and especially Kendle leaving their guards away behind on many plays.

Kendle employed the chance of made on several plays to completely upset his guard, and was allowed three times to dribble almost the length of the floor, and each time connected with the basket for two points. The great improvement in Klamath's play can better be appreciated when it is realized that the team representing Bend this year is the same to a man as last year. At that time there was little difference in the strength of the two teams.

With so many new players to start with, Coach French had a job on his hands to get the desired team-play necessary to win games, but his team certainly had it last night. The whole team functioned to a man, and the work of Cochet and Kendle most surely hasn't been equaled on any local court for a long time.

The superior accuracy of the local basket shooters can be seen in that of 75 attempts to score they were successful 32 times, for an average of 40 per cent, while Bend's 24 shots only connected nine times, for an average accuracy of 25 per cent. Much of Bend's shooting was in the last quarter from far back on the floor.

The same teams meet tonight, and the local boys deserve far better support than the attendance last night showed. The Klamath team played real basketball in a regular, determined fashion, and never once idled away a play. Its doubtful if even Medford could have stood up against them last night, and they will be just as determined to-night to repeat, while Bend will most surely do better.

Frank Hall returned an exceptionally good game, cutting the plays close and keeping the game clean all the way through.

FIELDS FAILS TO KNOCK OUT NEGRO BATTLER

Experts Disappointed in Welter's Failure to Kayo Lighter Man

NEW YORK, Feb. 16, (A. P.)—Jackie Fields, a fighter's idea of perpetual motion, has begun an Eastern invasion with another victory over Baby Joe Gans, negro battler from Fields' own home town of Los Angeles.

Boring in with both fists flying at all times, Fields battered out a decisive triumph on points over Gans in a ten-round match in Madison Square Garden last night.

The official verdict gave Fields the 147-pound championship of Los Angeles, but it did nothing to strengthen his position as the leading contender for Joe Dundee's welterweight crown and toga.

Out-weighting the negro boy by 5½ pounds, Fields appeared certain to win on a knockout as early as the second round. He had Gans stunned and reeling midway through the session, but apparently didn't know what to do with him now that he had him. It was the same story in the third round, when a loupé overhead right followed by a left hook, Fields' best weapon, had Gans holding on desperately. Try as he might, Fields could not finish his man. After that Jackie had no more of the well-known golden opportunities to send the crowd some 15,000 home early.

Although a small chorus of boos went up when the official verdict was announced, there seemed no question but that Fields had won a wide margin. The Associated Press score sheet gave Fields five rounds, Gans two, with three even.

Fields' showing was a disappointment to some Eastern observers. His failure to knock out a man he out-weighted by half a dozen pounds, when the time seemed ripe, was not calculated to boost his stock in the welterweight market.

Nails Gorman May Be Barred In Two States

Members of the Klamath Falls boxing commission today reaffirmed their intention of not only barring Nails Gorman from ever fighting in Klamath Falls again, but also of writing to boxing commissions up and down the coast to suggest similar action against the Hood River light heavyweight.

Gorman "ran out" of his main event with Orville Barr, sensational Spokane light heavyweight, in the ten round main event last night, ten hours before the bout was started. Entirely unbeknownst to members of the commission, Gorman had slipped away Tuesday night to fight a main event in Vallejo, Calif. He met Duane Miller, and was knocked as cold as a pickled herring in the seventh round. Up to the last round Gorman was taking an awful beating from the British Columbian battler.

The fight was 24 hours before

his scheduled fight last night with Orville Barr, contract for which he had signed.

At 11 a. m. yesterday he wired Tex Ringerstaff that he would not go on.

The commission was left "holding the bag" and at the last minute secured the services of Larry Holman, Bend trial horse, who was knocked cold in the third round by Barr.
