paid after his death by persons prominent in various fields of activity. There were references to him as "a true patriot." His contribution to journalism was described as "one of the greatest monuments an international figure has ever had." Adolph S. Gels, publisher of the New York Times, and one of the directors of the Associated Press, said that Mr. Stone, possessing the business qualifications of a fairy, a field of an armory, accepted an opportunity for service to his fellow man and in old age had reason to feel that he had been fully compensated for the fortunes he sacrificed.

"I have lived from the lightning rod to the radio," Mr. Stone said last year, "and I have seen electricity change the whole necessity of news gathering."

In retirement, he kept in close touch with the activities of the Associated Press, and he was frequently consulted for his advice.

"I am an old man," he said at the annual meeting of the members in 1925. "It is not at all unlikely that this is the last time I shall have an opportunity to talk to you."

"I regard the Associated Press as a public duty and every public duty is a privilege. If it were not so I should never have been with you."
