NOTED ACTRESS WAGES BATTLE AGAINST HABIT

Alma Rubens Suffering
From Narcotics; Return-
ed to Sanitarium

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 19. (AP)—Back again in a sanitarium, Alma Rubens, film actress, today was continuing her fight to regain her health and to conquer narcotic addiction. Members of Miss Rubens' family have stated that she is being given treatment in an attempt to overcome a nervous condition believed largely due to excessive use of narcotics but whether her return to the sanitarium was for this purpose alone, or was in connection with an operation she underwent last week in the Hollywood hospital, they did not disclose. The former screen star previously had spent considerable time in the private institution to which she was returned late yesterday.

Miss Rubens first was taken to her home from the hospital. The operation was announced as "slight," but soon after her release from the hospital, it was made known that she was not so well, and that it had been found that her home was not the proper place for treatment.

FLEET FOOTED SPRINTER FROM B. C. DEFEATED

Percy Williams Beaten to
Tape by Heavy Mus-
cled Football Star.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19. (AP)—A heavy muscled football star has come out of the middle west to beat Percy Williams, Vancouver B. C. sprinter, at his own game.

Jack Elder, halfback on the last Notre Dame football team, furnished the track season with a sensation last night when he conquered Williams in a 60-yard dash at the annual New York A. C. games in Madison Square Garden.

It was the first defeat of Williams' career. The double Olympic spring champion, up to last night, had met the greatest sprinters in the world at varying distances and always with the same success. During his present American invasion the Vancouver youth had downed all the leading eastern sprinters, including Karl Wildermuth of Georgetown, Jimmy Quinn of the New York A. C., and Jimmy Daley of Holy Cross. What is more he had trimmed Elder decisively in the Meadowbrook games at Philadelphia last week.

But Elder was not to be denied last night. He was off to a perfect start, sped down the straightaway like an express train and had just enough left to stand off Williams' closing burst on speed. Williams was slow off his mark, as usual, but his famous "kick" near the finish tripped by half a yard to nip the flying elder. The time, six and two-fifths seconds, failed by one-fifth of a second to equal the world's record, John Fitzpatrick, another Canadian was third, a step or two ahead of Quinn and Bob Wiese of the New York A. C.

The games developed two world's records and an amazing pole vault of 13 feet by Fred Sturdy of Yale.

Sharkey and Stribling
Rounding Into Train-
ing at Miami.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 19. (AP)—Under blazing skies in the heart of a winter playground of the rich, where society basks in royal fashion by the sea, two pugilists, incongruous in their surroundings, are making ready for the battle of the Everglades.

That fight arena on the night of February 27 will hold most of the "best people" Tex Rickard sought always to lure to his fistic shows. Now that Tex Rickard is dead, Jack Dempsey, the man he made a millionaire, is luring them to the box offices with all the magnetism of the old master of the ballyhoo. They will be there that night, in all probability, because the battle of Jack Sharkey and Young Stribling for heavyweight recognition will be "the thing" for the night, super-

ceding yachting parties, the costume balls, or even a visit to the Deauville Casino Rickard built.

But for the time being, at least the Boston strong boy and his Georgia rival are getting along without the patronage of society and wealth as far as their training periods are concerned.

Stribling attracts an audience that would enjoy any vaudeville show in addition to a share of the fight faithful from the ranks. In a crumbly Casino by the Sea, Stribling boxes sparring partners. Other boxers work against each other. A former vaudeville comedian announces the attractions and contributes a running fire of jokes while "Pa" Stribling does a balancing act with the boxer's two-year-old son.

Both Sharkey and Stribling are so far along the road to perfect condition that both are in danger of overdoing. Stribling, boxing an average of once a week throughout the south and southeast, is down to 185 pounds, as low as he dares to go. Sharkey, with a hard-won victory over K. O. Christner just under his belt, is within two pounds of being ready at 194. He planned a complete rest today and Stribling will retrain from labor both today and tomorrow.
