ASHLAND WILL MEET KLAMATH HIGH SATURDAY

Final Conference Game Will be Played in Rogue River Valley.

With only two defeats to mar its conference record, the Klamath Union high basketball team will play their final southern Oregon conference game next Saturday evening against the Ashland high school quintet, at Ashland.

Seven men will make the trip—Kempie, Olson, Pruitt, Robertson, R. Robinson, Crocker, Wayne Whitney and Lee Pruitt.

Aside from Medford—recognized as one of the greatest high school teams in the west today—Klamath has unquestionably led high school basketball competition of central Oregon and southern Oregon.

Principal encounters during the season include three victories over Grants Pass, one over Ashland, two over Bend, and two defeats at the hands of Medford.

On March 1 and 2, the high school team will journey to Bend to play the last two games of the four-game series for the championship of south central and central Oregon.

AMADOR LOSES TO TOWNSEND

Lightweight From British Columbia Stages Great Comeback Last Night.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20. (AP)—Billy Townsend, Vancouver, B. C. lightweight, apparently on the road to dreamland in the fourth round of his thrilling battle with Pedro Amador, the fighting San Blas Indian of Panama, came back in the sixth round to win on a technical knockout. Billy was floored for the count of eight with a smashing left hook in the pit of the stomach as the fourth ended. The blow took all his wind and made him sick. He took more punishment and was seasick in the fifth. They came out for the sixth with Billy somewhat revived and with the round about half over, Townsend shot his fist twice against the game Indian's jaw. Amador staggered up at the count of eight and Townsend was setting to deliver the finishing punch. Referee Gruman stepped between them and stopped the battle.

In the preliminaries Fred Kelly took a decision over Bobby Vernon; Billy Church knocked out Sammy Goldstein in the third round; Frankie Warnecke and Bob Judd went six rounds to a draw and Sam Warren got a technical knockout over Speed Murphy in the fourth.

Pelicans And Medford High Tangle Friday

The championship Medford high school basketball team, and the undefeated Pelican basketball team of Pelican City will meet in what gives promise of being the best basketball game seen in Klamath this season.

The game will be held Friday evening at 8 o'clock in the Pelican City gym.

The Pelicans have romped through the season winning 25 consecutive games and scoring 1197 points to their opponents' 521.

The Medford team is regarded by many observers as the best high school aggregation in the state, if not the northwest. The dope sheet gives the Pelicans a faint edge, but the games which furnish the basis of this reasoning occurred too early in the season to be correct. CARD ROOM IS ABLY DEFENDED BY JAY UPTON

Measure Seeking to Isolate Billiard Hall Fails in State Senate.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 20.—The card room is a necessary part of small town life, said Senator Jay H. Upton, Bend, on the floor of the Senate when the matter of accepting a minority or majority report of senate bill 121, came up for discussion. The bill, which sought to segregate the card room from the billiard parlor, designating the billiard game as a healthful sport which should be taken out of a bad atmosphere, was indefinitely postponed when the minority report was adopted.

"I don't see that this is a question where morals or decency are affected at all," was Upton's point of view. He stated that the bill did not prevent the practices forbidden in its provisions from being indulged in. Y. M. C. A. societies and the houses of fraternal orders. The bill would merely prevent the joint card room and billiard parlor and in most small towns they are financially unable to support one separated from the other," he said.

The bill was introduced by Senators Corbett and Moser, of Portland, and Senator Eddy, of Roseburg. "Portland can be different because it is so much larger," Upton concluded.

AGED VETERAN CRIMEAN WAR KILLS HIMSELF

Ninety-Nine Year Old Doctor Takes Own Life in N. J.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Feb. 20. (AP)—Dr. Edwin Pye Turner, 99-year-old veteran of the Crimean war who became front page news three years ago when a gray-bearded deputy sheriff arrested him on a half century old charge of horse stealing, was found a suicide today.

The old physician was found lying on the floor of his two room shack by a patrolman. A revolver was in his hand, and bullet wounds were found thru his neck and side. The shack is across the street from the railroad signal tower whose ladder he used until recently in public exhibitions of his exercising.

To the day of his death the doctor stoutly denied he ever had committed an act of wrong-doing, and held that a half brother, who bore the same name and a striking resemblance to him was the "Edwin Turner" who appeared on the record as the horse thief and jail breaker in Ringhamton, N. J., in 1880. Deputy Sheriff H. Foster Black who came from Ringhamton to serve the 50-year old warrant, died more than a year ago at the age of 91. Dr. Osbaldeston later publicly forgave him.

SPEED LIMIT BILL LOST BY SINGLE VOTE

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 20. (AP)—A proposal to increase the speed limit on Oregon highways from 35 to 40 miles per hour, was stepped on by the house committee on roads and highways and automobiles and roads, at a joint meeting Monday evening. A tie vote was cast and Chairman Winslow cast his vote in favor of leaving the limit at 35 miles.

The increase was suggested as an amendment to Senate Bill 162 which is now in the hands of the two house committees.

was champion of the Sweden carnival. Alex Peterson, the youngest man entered in the longest ski race in the world comes from southern Sweden, having been in this country little more than 10 months. In 1925 he was champion of his country and would have competed with Mr. Peterson for the Kings Cup but for illness of Mr. Peterson which prohibited the match. The young man will fight it out at Port Klamath on Friday.

W. Nordquist coming from the northern section of Sweden was next introduced. While in northern Sweden he was champion of the Swedish army.

Andy Myra, of Finland, member of the Olympic club of San Francisco was introduced as an all around athlete specializing as a marathon runner. Mr. Myra has a table full of trophies. He first began skiing in major events in Finland in 1909. He was winner of the tryout for the Olympic games in San Francisco in 1928 against 34 entrants in the 26 mile race. The race was from the ferry building to the Cliff House in late January of this year.

Oliver Packett, termed as the Sourdough of the Cascades was next introduced as Klamath's best native skier and one of the best boosters of winter sports in Klamath county.

Emil Norsten of the Ski Lines of Bend was introduced as the "Old War Horse". He has been a veteran of many events in Northern Sweden and of two former 42 mile races. He is often termed as the most scientific skier ever in this country. He is the oldest man in the entry list. Norsten is 42 years of age.

Andy Versto, a gigantic Norwegian is ready for the event. Versto is a jumper of ability, establishing a record of 155 feet and 7 inches.

McMillan, Idaho's forward and leading scorer, accumulated 15 points, doing most of his execution in the second half, being held down in two counts in the first by Buck Grayson's fine checking. Aase started the scoring for the Staters and from then on it was an Oregon parade.

LEWIS WINS MATCH

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 20. (UP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former heavyweight wrestling champion of the world, defeated Mike Rosarno, Italian champion, in a two hour match here last night.

The bout was awarded to Lewis, when Rosarno failed to respond to a five minute rest after he dived through the ropes in the third fall.
